LONDON, Oct. 8.—Despatches from the East report that a sanguina; conflict had taken place on the Turkish frontier between the Montenegrins and the Turks.

BIARNITZ, Oct. 8.—The Marquis De Moustier, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Chevalier De Nigrie, Italian Ambassador, arrived here just before the troubles broke out in Italy, and have since been in constant consultation with the Emperor. It is said that the following plan for the settlement of the Roman question has been agreed upon: Italy to take possession of the Roman Provinces; Pope Plus IX., to remain in Rome and retain the Government of the city until his death, when the temporal power of the Pope shall cease.
