The Gartelauhe, an illustrated German weekly, published at Leipzig, has the enormous circulation of 330,000 copies.

A detachment of Nova Scotia Indians having arrived at Ottawa in order to come to some understanding with the Government concerning a railway that is projected through their lands.

The Parisian newspapers chronicle the death of the woman who in 1848 personated the Goddess of Liberty in the popular processions. She kept an eating-house, and, at the time of her death, weighed 452 pounds.

The site of the celebrated temple of Diana, at Ephesus, has just been discovered by Mr. Wood, an indefatigable British archaeologist. It was buried to a depth of twenty-two feet. The pavement was found strewn with broken pillars and marbles of great beauty, which are being excavated for the British museum.

A guest at a hotel in Belfast, Maine, on being told at dinner was ready, stripped off his coat, and accompanied by his wife, entered the dining-room in his shirt sleeves. This bequest is numbered with a condition of unprecedented singularity. Sir Thomas has strictly enjoined that neither his eldest daughter nor her husband nor any Roman Catholic shall enter the house.

The weather reports inform the readers thereof that on Tuesday morning there was a "big blow" in the vicinity of Mount Washington if not elsewhere. The anemometer on the summit indicated the velocity of the wind to be 132 miles per hour, equal to a pressure of 87 pounds per square inch.
