## GREAT CHANGE IN GERMAN ARMY

Berlin, April 17.—By a single announcement in the official Military Gazette, the German army has been

revolutionized. The announcement only said that henceforth candidates for positions as officers in the Prussian Guard regiments are to be selected exclusively with regard to mental and moral capacity, without regard to birth.  
Henceforth none but sons of nobility, landed gentry or guardians of estates, are to be admitted to the ranks of the Prussian Guard regiments. The poor man, however clever, however skilled, was hopelessly debarred. From now on the crack regiments of the German army are open to all-comers, provided they have the brains and character.  
The exclusion of the bourgeoisie from the officer corps of the guards has long been a cause of complaint in Prussia, and the news that the war office had decided to break with the old system has caused widespread gratification throughout the army. Poor men have long been able to become officers in the lesser known regiments, and taking them all round, they were immeasurably superior to those in the guards. Hitherto, however, only noblemen have been eligible as officers for these re-

giments and the annoyance felt by those holding commands in other regiments has been re-echoed throughout the entire army. Now the overwhelmingly predominant caste has received a check and the army has been democratized. The results of this can hardly be estimated, but on all hands it is recognized that the army now holds out a career to any man of means, however poor, and the standard of officers is sure to be enhanced enormously.  
Effect has already been given to the order by the appointment of two cadets from the military academy at Gross-Lichterfelde as junior lieutenants in Berlin Guard regiments.
