SUBSTITUTES FOR SCOLDING

A Few Decided Words in Even Tone and Fair Punishment the Best Remedy

If we remember that in the household we are making by our own examples the very tone of voice, look and manner of the children, we shall take ourselves to task for giving way in the past to the sharp expletive word, the irritated look and the untuned voice. When we recall, also, that the children's spirits are but the more ruffled and their nerves chafed by "scolding," we shall feel that that habit merits our poor opinion, and will welcome any substitute that may prove effective and have fewer ill results. That which we all recognize as "scolding" is not so much in the words as in the manner, perhaps. Besides the counts against it given above, there is this to say that it does not accomplish its purpose. It arouses the combativeness of the child, puts it on the defensive. Authority, decision, can be shown as well, and better, if the parent is entirely composed or seems to be so.

The son of Daniel Webster said his father's habit with him in his boyhood was to stand him between the paternal knees, gently and firmly clasp him by the arms, and then look at him long and sorrowfully, without speaking and without anger. He said these mournful looks never failed of effect. Not many parents can bring pictures of their erring children such as a face and such eyes as Daniel Webster's, but his method might often work well in spite of that. Christ himself only looked reproachfully on Peter when in the hall, after the arrest, that disciple had denied him. Yet Peter went out and wept bitterly on account of his weakness and disloyalty.

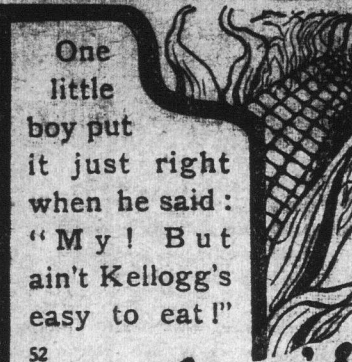
Gentle and entirely self-controlled talk with the child about his misdeeds cannot fail to influence it. A manner and voice also that manifest the love and benevolence that the mother feels within, while an irritated method hides the kind intention.

A few decided words, gently uttered and proportionate punishment are the fitting method and remedy. The scolding parent's mind is clearly made up and he will reiterate as to the course of action.

None of us wishes to be pictured in the memories of our children hereafter as having been petulant or irascible or lacking in self control. The scolding manner comes perilously near to giving unpleasant photographs to remain for the years to come. All the ends of family government can be reached without such damaging impression. Self-poise, serene looks, calm, decisive words are best.

CALGARY WOMEN PURPOSE FORMING A CIVIC LEAGUE

What is the matter with having a Women's Civic League in Calgary?

While many women are clamoring for the franchise, there is much work we may do for the good of humanity, and our own city, if we only utilize what powers we already have.

There is great need, right here, of woman's hand in both the moral and social uplift, as well as in the actual civic affairs. We have had unrest and disturbance in our city government, and while our men have formed a civic league, to aid in the re-construction of said government, what is to hinder our women bestirring themselves, and turning their energies in the same direction?

1,600 Women Vote in Calgary

We have some 1,600 women voters in Calgary. Do the women fully realize the power of such a vote at any election? Our vote, solid, could turn the scales in favor of any candidate, and thus aid the men, in what they deem best for the city's welfare.

Not only this, but there are many things we can do for the good of our city, which means, the good of the home, and our boys and girls.

The women of Boston has a Woman's Municipal league, which has been of the greatest value to that city.

After an existence of three and a half years, it has a membership of 1,800, representing every race, creed and occupation.

The work of the league is grouped under four heads: Streets, Alleys, Education and Housing.

The Streets and Alleys committee, employs a salaried woman inspector, who receives complaints from district committees, and carries them in person to the proper city officials.

The Woman's Municipal league of New York, which was founded in 1897 by Mrs. Charles Russell Towell, has a fine record of much the same work. It has winning committees on Health, Streets, Women's Court, Dance Halls, Police Tenements, Parks and Playgrounds. Ten district chairmen preside over the work, in as many sections of the city.

Opportunities For Good Work

Surely there is plenty of work for us along many of these lines, to be done right here and now.

The city officials can do much to give us a clean, moral and healthful city, but the women banded together in some such way, as suggested by the reports from New York and Boston, can aid greatly, in more quickly bringing about the desired end.

We hope the example set us by the women of older cities, may, incite the women of Calgary to be alive to the opportunity for real downright service, in our midst.

A meeting to form a Woman's Civic or Municipal league, will be called at an early date, and we trust that every woman, who has as well as hundreds who have no vote, will come and assist us in forming a league so strong, that its influence will be felt. Instead of using soap use almond cream meal sifted into the water. MABEL: To keep the hairlight it should be washed at least two or three times a month with a good shampoo. When washing the hair be sure that you get all the shampoo mixture out of it, for there is nothing that will spoil the lovely golden shade as soap if it is allowed to remain. The hair should be rinsed and sprayed four or five times and if the hair is particularly heavy it should be rinsed in six or seven different waters and sprayed with a strong spray. This is the only way to get all the shampoo out of the hair. Never rub soap directly on the hair, for this spoils it. If you use a good shampoo you will not have to put anything in the water to soften it. Too much ammonia, borax or soda, or anything of that kind will in time make the hair dry and lifeless. 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A WOMAN LIKELY TO BE ONE OF NEW YORK'S "BIG FOUR"

New York, July 31.—One of the New York's "Big Four," as the delegates at large are known, to be sent to the national convention of the new party at Chicago next week, probably will be a woman. This announcement was made today, by Wm. H. Hotchkiss, state chairman of the new party. Who the woman will be has not been decided. Mr. Hotchkiss says the selection would likely be left to the feminine wing of the party.

According to the chairman, the three other delegates at large probably will be Oscar Vraus and Henry Stoddard, and either Chauncey J. Hamlin of Buffalo or Virgil K. Kellogg, of Watertown.

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
