Weight of a Million Dollars.

E. B. Elett, the Government Assayer, has computed the weight of a million dollars in gold and silver and the results are as follows: The standard gold dollar contains 25.8 grains, and a standard silver dollar contains 25.7 grains. One million standard gold dollars consequently weigh 25,800,000 grains, or 53,750 ounces troy, 4,479 pounds troy, 5,760 grains each, or 1,843,100 "shores". One million standard silver dollars weigh 25,700,000 grains, or 53,250 ounces troy, 4,425 pounds troy, 5,700 grains each, or 1,831,000 "shores". The difference between the two is 100,000 "shores", or 2,000 pounds.

The Wild Flowers of Montana.

The wild flowers of Montana are as abundant as those of the Alps, and more varied. Choice of them all, because most delicate and fragrant is a white, star-shaped, was like blossom which grows very close to the ground, and the large golden stems of which give out an odor like mingled hyacinth and lily of the valley. The people call it the mountain-lily. There is another lily, however, and a real one—yellow with purple stamens—that grows on high peaks in shaded places. The yellow flowering current abounds on the lower levels, and the streams are often bordered with thickets of wild rose bushes. Dandelions abound, but do not open in full, rounded perfection. The common blue larkspur, however, is as well developed as in our eastern gardens, and the little yellow violet which in the States haunts the woods and coyses is at home in Montana, abiding in the moist valleys among the black, dry hillsides. Small sunflowers are plentiful, the bluebell is equally abundant in valleys and on mountain ridges, and in early June there blooms an unique flower like the shooting star, shaped like a shuttlecock. There are a dozen other pretty flowers, but I could not learn their names—among them a low-growing mass the clumps of which are strewn over with delicate white or purple blossoms.

Paper Blanks.

To a Manchester firm belongs the credit of utilizing paper in this especially serviceable direction. At once cheap, clean, warm, and easily manipulated, paper seems expressly designed for the purpose to which it is now for the first time successfully applied. Of late years various attempts have been made to turn it to account in the manner described; but owing to the cracking nature of the paper and the impossibility of securing ventilation beneath paper covering, the idea was abandoned again and again. In the production of the "Chartaline" blanket, as the new invention is called, these defects have been overcome in a satisfactory manner. Ventilation is obtained as full, free and perfect as takes place beneath an ordinary woolen blanket. The new bed covering is made of two sheets of paper, between which a layer of wadding chemically prepared, is inserted in such a way that it cannot gather in lumps. The edges are strongly wadded; so that there is no possibility of a separation of the two pieces taking place. The paper manufactured from the strongest fibre known, which, being softened by a special process, is free from the objectionable cracking and rusting sound that, as a rule, accompanies the manipulation of paper. It is true there is a slight crisp feeling when new, but this wears off and the covering becomes soft and limp. At the same time the strength of the "Chartaline" blanket is much greater than might be imagined, having regard to the character of the material from which it is manufactured. As far as looks go, the new blanket has all the appearance of a woolen one, while the warmth it affords exceeds that of its predecessor when the size and weight of the two are brought into comparison. The trifling cost at which these serviceable articles may be obtained can, however, when all is told, be considered the chief advantage of the invention. Manufacturer and Dealer.
