Only through the boys and girls being thoroughly trained and grounded in the principles of total abstinence, and making it their life work, can we ever hope to have our country and the world for prohibition. The workers in London are beginning to wake up to the necessity of more active and carnest work in this direction, having now an industrial scincol for girls held every Saturday afternoon, with an attendance of 80 and 13 teachers, besides the superintendent. Prizes are given for perfect recitation of Scripture texts, etc. They also have a Band of Hope, which is not simply to amuse, but to instruct in the moral and physical effects of the use of alcohol, and the reasons why they should be total abstainers, and so the work goes on "line upon line" and precept upon precept.
