

The Prince of Wales Pays His First Official Visit to That Principality.

Extraordinary Precautions Against Anarchists.

Queen Victoria Attended by a Strong Staff of Detectives.

The Prince and the Eisteddfod. London, June 16 .- "After 600 years the Prince of Wales comes home." So sang Lewis Morris in an ode read before the royal visitors to the Eisteddfod at Carnarvon on Wednesday. The ode was read in English, and the Prince of Wales audibly protested to those around him that the chronological statement referred to was not quite accurate, as he had been in Wales before, though certainly not in a public manner. The royalties remained for the final ceremony of the proclamation of the chairing and crowning of the chief bard of the year, who proved to be a very nervous Nonconformist parson from the Swansea Valley, named Benjamin Davies. enne. Arrangements for international co-operation against the Anarchists are believed to be making satisfactory progress. Germany is the principal obstacle. More complete police co-operation will undoubtedly be agreed upon. The French police system will be reorganized and placed under one national head.

Scared in Britain. Chief Inspector Melville, head of the special or secret political department at Scotland Yard, has been pretty well worked to death in the last few months, what with murderous Anarchists and roving royalties. The latter are a perpetual worry, for in these revolutionary days they have to be watched with the greatest care, and Melville has to do the work with a scanty staff and inadequate funds.

A dozen men, under Inspector Sweeney, accompanied the Prince of Wales throughout his journey to and from Wales. A half dozen are in constant but unobtrusive attendance upon the Czarewitch, and two or three look after the Duke of Coburg. With the staff thus reduced a strong force of detectives had to be provided for the Queen, who took it into her head to go to Aldershot on Wednesday afternoon. She witnessed the grand military tattoo on the same night, slept at Aldershot in a tent, miscalled a royal pavilion, in the famous camp, reviewed 16,000 troops on Thursday and returned to Windsor in the afternoon of that day. From Wednesday morning till Thursday evening London was almost denuded of its special detective force, and had the Anarchist desperadoes been aware of the fact they might have committed outrages to their hearts' content with comparative safety to the mselves.

The Scotland Yard people have repeatedly applied to the treasury for an additional grant to provide an increased force of special selected men, but in vain, although it has been proved that the corresponding French force, with much less work to do, is five times as numerous as the English staff. It will probably require an Anarchist attempt, say on the Prime Minister or Chancellor of the Exchequer. or the blowing up of a public building to bring the treasury to a sense of its responsibility.

Women's Work Exhibition.

Pullman Workers Clamoring To Be Taken Back.

They Will Now Work at the Reduced Wages.

Big Four Striking Switchmen Will Not Be Re-Engaged.

SAN JOSE, Cal., July 16 .- The strike situation here remains unchanged. All trains are running without interference. MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 16. - No orders for a strike on the Great Northern Railroad have been received and it is doubtful if men would go out if ordered to strike. The men who did go out are now seeking employment on other roads. All

trains are running regularly.
CINCINNATI, O., July 16.—The Big Four striking switchmen presented an appeal to the company last night asking to be reinstated, and were flatly refused. These men

went out in sympathy with the Pullman strikers. MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 16. — It is rumored the Chicago and Northwestern and the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railways will make an all round reduction in wages of 10 per cent to take effect Aug. 1. This measure is looked upon as a result of the great strike.

CHICAGO, July 16.-The announcement that strikers at Pullman were on the point of surrendering and asking for employment in the palace car works at the reduced wages is confirmed. Thomas Heathcote. leader of the Pullman strikers, admits that all his influence and that of other laber leaders was required to prevent a general examination, and the immense bandanna orders from headquarters any day to open the carshops which have been closed more than eight weeks. anguished tones that Mr. Heathcote said in answer to a question, "I don't know what these men would do if the shop doors were thrown open tomorrow." He said, "It has been hard to keep many of the men from going back to work and after they do," he continued, sadly, "I suppose there companies will not be likely to give employment to the man who led this strike and held the men out against one of the greatest corporations in the world." A Pullman official says a week would be required to get ready for opening the works. They expect the announcement of opening to be made this week and expect to begin operations with all the men needed. Mr. Heathcote stated that the A. R. U. had never donated a dollar to the hungry Pullman strikers, and that the only way Debs had shown his sympathy for the strikers had been by calling out the railway men right and left. Heathcote added that he did not expect the railway union to furnish any funds though a number of strikers thought that would be an appropriate manner for him to show his sympathy. Debs was informed last night that it was the intention of the workmen at Pullman to return to their duties at the earliest possibility, removing the original cause of the railway strike. Debs said he could not give the report credence. He said: "If it be true that Pullman operators are about to go back to the conditions of servitude again from which they revolted on May 11 without a single wrong redressed, it is perhaps the best proof to the world that they have been so subjugated and enslaved by the methods of the Pullman company that they are unable to continue their self-assertion in spite of all we have endeavored to do for them. However, their return to work can neither help nor harm us in our general strike. The Pullman question necessarily became a secondary one when the General Managers' Association took its cudgels to drive the American Railway Union out of existence, and its recent refusal to consider any proposition emanating from us leaves us with no possible retreat. We have fought the cause of these people until we are so

embroiled that we must continue to fight without them." At the Union depot every train on all roads using that terminal was reported on time.
