MORE TROUBLE.

A Newfoundland Vessel Seized and Held by Venezuelans,

Halifax, May 20.-Chief Officer Sullivan and three sailors of the British schooner Newday, which was seized at Venezuela four weeks ago, left their vessel and came north by the British steamer Taymouth Castle. The Newday is owned by Capt. Slocumb, of Parrsboro, N. S., but is not now a Canadian vessel, having transferred to a Newfoundland register, and is therefore outside the jurisdiction of the Canadian Government.

Washington, May 20 .- Yesterday the debate on the immigration bills was opened by Mr. Bartholdt (Rep., Mo.). The bills were four in number. One, known variously as the Bartholdt, McCall or Lodge bill, provided an educational test. It excluded all male persons between 16 and 60 years of age who cannot read and write English or some other language.

Granted a New Trial on the Ground of Misdirection to the Jury by Justice

Toronto, May 20.-Michael Brennan, now under sentence of death for the murder of J. A. Strathy, of Barrie, has been granted a new trial, on the Chief Justice Armour. W. Q.C., appealed on Brennan's behalf to the Divisional Court. The judgment of the court rests entirely on the ground that the learned judge at the trial should have left it to the jury to say whether there was sufficient provocation to reduce the crime from murder to manslaughter. Chief Justice Meredith says: was for the jury so say whether the act of the deceased in putting the risoner out of the house was accompanied by more violence than was

Mr. Justice Rose says: "There was evidence to go to the jury that Mr. Strathy was not doing what he had a legal right to do. If the jury so found, it was then for them to say whether this was such provocation to the prisoner as to deprive him of

the power of self-control." Mr. Justice McMahon says: "The learned trial judge held that it was question of law, and withdrew from the jury the question whether more force than necessary was used in putting the prisoner out of the house, whether this force deprived the pris-oner of self-control, and whether he fired the pistol shot while in that condition. These questions should have been left to the jury."




