ASSESSMENT ACT DEPUTATIONS

Tax Question Discussed Before Special Committee.

IS ACCEPTABLE IN PRINCIPLE

Views of Municipal, Trade and Fraternal Representatives Laid Before Commission.

Toronto, May 14.—The special committee of the Legislature to which the new assessment act was referred, met yesterday morning to hear deputations.

The executive of the Ontario Municipal Association was represented by F. Mackelcan, K. C., and F. R. Hutton, of the assessment department of Hamilton, and City Solicitor Casswell, City Council Fullerton, and Mr. Foreman, of Toronto's assessment department. The Retail Merchants' Association, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the Single Tax Association, the Toronto Board of Trade, were also represented, and the following named delegates represented the Fraternal Societies' Association: W. F. McCammon, Belleville; Lee and W. F. Montague, Hamilton; H. J. Speigrove, Cobourg; J. A. Patterson, Toronto; Dr. Mallory, Port Hope, and Mr. Dowler, Tilsonburg.

Mr. Mackelcan, the first speaker, said the revenue of Hamilton would be reduced \$35,000 by the bill in its present form. Mr. Mackelcan proceeded to lay down the general principles on which taxation would be levied, when Attorney-General Gibson interrupted to say that the general principles were not before the committee. The commission had considered the aspect of the subject, Mr. Mackelcan proposed that all tangible personal property should be taxed, irrespective of any debt upon it. He proposed in cases of stock that the assessment be on the average price of the stock for a year. Mercantile concerns should pay a business tax, and also a tax on incomes. This would take the place of the complicated house tax. He objected also to the exemption of plant and machinery from school taxes.

The Manufacturers' Association representatives approved the principles of the bill. The retail merchants' representatives did not oppose principles, but objected to uniform business tax, which would force smaller men out of business. Some retailers were doing business on about \$200, with a capital of \$1,000. Large wholesale houses would escape an enormous amount of personality taxes. The retailers proposed a tax of three to five per cent on retail merchants, and ten per cent on the wholesale merchants.

Mr. Gibson agreed that there appeared to be an inequality here. W. B. Rogers, for the retailers, said departmental stores would pay less

than they do now, while even now they paid too little. He also objected to the house tax and said it could not be collected.

J. F. Ellis, president Toronto Board of Trade, said that wholesalers would pay more under the act than under the present law. A calculation had been made, including several large wholesale houses here. Fraternal societies asked that the income from the investment of surplus funds be exempt. The committee adjourned till Tuesday.

THE U. S. NOWHERE

Imperial Federation Would Eclipse Her Commercially.

London, May 14.—H. G. Parsons read a paper on "Our Colonial Kingdoms" Tuesday before the Royal Colonial Institute. He advocated an Imperial cabinet, including colonialists, and imperialism of England's national debt, on the ground that the debt was largely made in helping the colonies. Dr. Parkin, who made the speech of the evening, said that England alone could never equal the United States commercially. England's only hope was in a union of the empire. Then the United States would be nowhere. He said that General Wood, Governor of the Philippines, told him he was going to see Lord Cromer in Egypt, and Lord Cromer, in turn, to learn the secret of British success in the administration of alien colonies.

STRIKE MEASURE FOR AUSTRALIA

Government Takes Radical Means to End Trouble.

BILL NOT TO BE PERMANENT

It Compels Workmen to Give Four Night's Notice or Be Considered as a Striker.

Melbourne, Victoria, May 14.—In the Legislative Assembly yesterday Premier Irvine made a speech on the subject of the strike. He said the country faced a long-meditated revolt against established authority. The issue concerned every country. The strike had thrown the state into confusion, and it would be a fight to a finish.

The Premier then moved the second reading of a bill providing for the suppression of the strike, which is not retrospective, and which will not remain in force after the termination of the strike. It provides that an employee leaving his work without giving four nights' notice is to be assumed to have joined the strike, and will incur the penalty of \$500 fine or a year's imprisonment, with loss of pension, and will be ineligible in the future for Government employment. The bill also forbids interference with employees, the collection of strike funds, and the collection of money in any manner. The bill further empowers the police to destroy documents encouraging the strike, makes printers thereof offenders against the law, and declares meetings to be unlawful if four strikers are present. All persons refusing to disperse are liable to arrest without warrants, and the police are empowered to forcibly enter meetings.

An amendment expressing regret at the strike and promising that Parliament would consider the grievances of the railroad men if they return to work was defeated by 58 to 30.

WOMAN'S STRANGE TALE

Man Supposed to Be Her Brother Is Really Her Husband.

Cleveland, May 14.—Caroline F. Upham, who has for many years held the position of chief stenographer for the common pleas court, has brought suit for divorce. The petition unfolded a story which her most intimate friends and acquaintances would not have believed probable or possible.

It stated that E. R. Whitney, consulting mechanical expert for the White Sewing Machine Company, also a well known authority and writer on mechanical construction and the inventor of a fountain pen among a number of other things, was not her brother, but her husband by a common law marriage.

Mrs. Upham or Mrs. Whitney, as she now declares her name to be, is a woman of marked ability and education and the confident of a number of the largest law firms in the city. She speaks several languages and her services as a stenographer were sought after in all important cases. She was supposed to have been a widow, her husband dying soon after marriage. The couple lived in a fashionable hotel, and both were welcomed into the educational and literary coteries of the city.

The petition filed states that for the past five years her husband has grossly neglected her and failed to contribute anything to her support. She asks for a legal separation and alimony.

CARNEGIE CAUGHT IT

His Criticism of Canada Brings English Press Upon Him.

London, May 14.—Andrew Carnegie is evidently being found out by the English press, which has hitherto seemed to regard him as a kind of beneficent fairy queen. His wanton attack on Canada finds no sympathizers, while even the Scotch papers reproduce the Outlook's onslaught upon what it called "the bastard individualism of his Pittsburgh carrot bonus philanthropy." The Canadian Gazette, in an article entitled "Carnegie Vinegar," shows that Mr. Carnegie is ignorant of the elementary position, and prays that Canada may be delivered from Carnegie's benefactions.

Fell Sixty-Five Feet.

Fort William, May 14.—Yesterday morning a workman named Thomas Greentree, of Toronto, fell 65 feet from one of the steel trusses on the new coal handling plant. It is not thought that Greentree is fatally injured, although a number of his ribs were broken on one side, and also one of his legs fractured.

ONTARIO'S CROPS PROMISE WELL

The Spring Bulletin Gives Favorable Outlook.

WHEAT HAS WINTERED WELL

Clover Is in Good Condition and Prospects for Live Stock Industry Is Good.

Ottawa, May 13.—The May bulletin, about to be issued by the Ontario Department of Agriculture, will contain the following regarding crop conditions on May 13: Fall Wheat—The crop bulletin issued in November last said that the outlook for fall wheat was most promising, the crop being healthy in color and vigorous-looking generally, although not having as much top as was usually seen at that time. It is safe to say that much less wheat will be plowed up this spring than last year. It is altogether, fall wheat may now be described as promising to be from fair to good. Only the faintest mention has been made of the Hessian fly, which, for the past few years, has been the scourge of the wheat fields of Western and Southwestern Ontario. The acreage is thought to be less than in the last year or two.

Winter Rye—Very little winter rye is now grown in Ontario, the acreage is so small that it can hardly be considered as a staple crop. What was sown, however, wintered well, considered as a whole.

Clover fields, as a rule, came through the winter in the same condition in which they entered it only a comparatively small portion having been reported as "choking," and as the catch of last year's sowing was a good one, the crop faced the spring with the best prospects. Meadows have a good thick bottom, even though spring growth has been backward. The prospects for clover are particularly bright in the western half of the province. Vegetation—Notwithstanding the fact that the snow disappeared early, and that warm weather in March gave promise of advanced vegetation, the cold and unusually dry weather prevailing in April retarded growth to such a degree that conditions were only about normal on the 1st of May, and relatively backward compared with the earlier prospects of the season.

Spring Seeding—The bulk of the reports are to the effect that seeding was well advanced by the end of April, many being only beginning. While some complaint of the soil being hard and unsuitable for spring work, a much larger number describe the seed-bed as being in the best possible condition. The least favorable reports concerning the extent and quality of seeding came from the counties forming the Niagara Peninsula.

Live Stock—Taken altogether, the outlook for live stock may be classed as good. Distemper appeared among horses in various parts of the province, but hardly in sufficient degrees to be considered epidemic. Cattle are reported a trifle thin, but healthy. Sheep are reported to be in fair condition, but the dog is said to prevent many from raising mutton and wool. Lambing is reported later than usual, and a considerable number of the ewes dropped have died. With the exception of the outbreak of hog cholera in some of the Lake Erie counties, the swine industry is most promising. The litters have done better than those of last year. Piggeries generally are well stocked with pigs, and the market for hogs is good. The only damage to fruit trees between November and April was caused by a plague of field mice, which appear to be working steadily westward, the center of operations now being in the Ontario counties, while a year ago they were most hurtful in the counties along the St. Lawrence.

BIG AUTOMOBILE RACE

The Contestants Will Ride From Paris to Madrid.

Paris, May 13.—The Paris-Madrid automobile races were inaugurated this morning, 58 contestants in the tourist class being from the Automobile Club of France, from the Place de la Concorde, between 7 a.m. and noon. The recent rains promised heavy roads, reports from Madrid stating that some of the stretches were in a dangerous condition and requiring great caution.

The start was made in fine weather. The place De La Concorde presented a gay appearance, being thronged with participants in the contest and hundreds of others intending to follow the racers over the first stretch. Many ladies were seated in the racing cars, expecting to leave their parties at Fontainebleau or other nearby points. Today's run is from Paris to Pougues, a distance of 221 kilometers. The machines will enter Spain May 20 and reach Madrid May 26.

Several Americans were among the occupants of the participating cars. "Tod" Sloan, who has developed skill as a chauffeur, piloted the way ahead of the racers. W. K. Vanderbilt, Jun., who has entered for the speed test, will start later, but he was a passenger today on Fournier's car.
