United States Consul at St. Thomas a Victim of Pneumonia.

St. Thomas, March 15. - Col. Michael J. Burke, United States consul in this city, died at the consulate at 4:15 this morning. He contracted a severe cold a week ago, pneumonia setting in last Sunday, and he was in a dangerous condition all day Tuesday, Col. Burke, who came here from Chicago, was appointed during President McKinley's first regime. Of Irish descent, he was an American citizen by adoption, having been born in Canada some fifty years ago. Col. Burke was a finished speaker. He had traveled extensively n America, and in his earlier life was a telegraph operator, and for several sessions worked for the old Montreal Telegraph Company in the House of Commons, an experience to which Col. Burke always liked to refer to. Just prior to his coming to St. Thomas, Col. Burke was engaged in newspaper work in Louisville and Chicago.


