CORRESPONDENCE.**FIRE PROTECTION.**

To the Editor of The Advertiser: Some time ago a correspondent of your paper urged the use of more fire engines. I believe his suggestion would be a proper solution of the problem so soon as ample mains are provided. The scheme recently voted down for extension of mains provided, I believe, the necessary enlarged mains. The 12-inch mains along Central avenue, Queen's avenue and Horton street were well designed to deliver ample supply at Adelaide street to all mains running east, besides giving a much increased flow for all intersecting mains east of Clarence street. The 12-inch main on William street down to Nelson street and east on Nelson street and that on King street to Queen's Park, covered parts particularly needing increased supply. Other mains included gave needed help in various districts. I am at a loss to understand why the ratepayers failed to vote for the added protection. The mains to the east certainly very largely improve the position of every merchant and other residents in that district. The east end business men certainly failed to take advantage of the opportunity. The Real Estate Owners' Association must surely have all their property west of Waterloo street, otherwise they would not have objected to main extension. Those in the west of the city should also have remembered that the destruction of one part would injuriously affect the value of assessable property, and so throw a larger burden on themselves, it being quite probable that factories and others burnt out may go to other towns.

However, the bylaw has been voted down and it now behooves those interested to go into the matter afresh and ascertain whether the scheme

should not be submitted again next January with such added mains as are desirable. I think that the Queen's avenue main should be extended to Quebec street, and the Horton street main by such route as is available to Eglinton street. Twelve-inch mains had better be laid at once to the above indicated points, as they certainly will be needed when the suburbs are annexed. This question of additions to the scheme heretofore submitted should be discussed by those interested with the waterworks engineer, who can explain present pipes.

Doubtless the scheme submitted was voted down for lack of information. I have found even merchants on Dundas street who, in ignorance of the fact that the scheme brought out large mains to Adelaide street and so largely increased their fire protection, actually voted against it. This should not be allowed again. The vital necessity of ample capacity in the distributing mains should be made clear to all. Yours,

PAYNE LAW CHANGES

Domestic Animals Must Pay Duty When Re-Imported.

Washington, Aug. 22.—The customs regulations governing the free entry of domestic products exported and afterwards brought back to this country, amended to conform to the requirements of the Payne law, have been issued by Acting Secretary of the Treasury Reynolds.

The new law exempts domestic animals from the duty free provision when returned to this country. They will have to pay the same duty when re-imported as foreign animals. The regulation permitting the entry free of duty on domestic animals exported for racing and exhibition purposes is not affected by the other provisions.
