A Former Well-Known London Railwayman Met Death Suddenly.
LIVED IN THE EAST END
Was a Son of Mr. Patrick Foley, of 703 Lorne Avenue—No Particulars of Accident Received as Yet.

On Sunday night Mr. Peter Foley, a C. P. R. conductor, living at 552 Princess Avenue, received a telegram from Copper Cliff, notifying him that his brother, John Foley, had met death by accident at that place.

Besides his parents and his two brothers, his brother William being now at Moosejaw, he is survived by six sisters, Mrs. Donald McLeod, of Banff; Mrs. Thomas Kinship, of St. Princes Avenue; Mrs. Ayes, of Keweenaw, Saska.; and Misses Edith and Eva, at home.

Mr. Foley was very well known and greatly esteemed in London and St. Thomas, his wife having been Miss Mary Masters, of St. Thomas. Besides his wife, he leaves three little children, Harold, Kathleen and Maria, the eldest of whom is 7 years of age.
