## NEW HARRIMAN MAP

It is 19 Feet High and Covers Over 300 Feet of Canvas.

New York, May 31.—The great map before which the late E. H. Harriman spent so many hours planning new campaigns has made way for a still greater map, upon which are shown about 1,500 miles of railroads that Mr. Harriman did not live to see constructed. The new map is nineteen feet high and covers more than 300 square feet of canvas. Fifteen men were required to deliver the greatest

roller on which it will be manipulated. When half unrolled it covers all of one end of the directors' room in the Union Pacific offices at 129 Broadway.

The new map shows every little branch of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific systems, including the lines which the latter road is building in Mexico. The old map did not show the Mexican lines, as it was drawn before Mr. Harriman decided to extend his lines about 1,500 miles south of the Rio Grande.

The map was drawn at the Chicago offices of the Union Pacific and more than a year was spent in its preparation. The cost of its preparation exceeded \$6,000.

More than passing interest attaches to the old map. Mr. Harriman was accustomed to sit for long periods before the chart, planning an extension here, a cutoff there, a branch line between such and such points. He came to know every spot on the map. At directors' meetings he frequently directed some junior officer to point out a certain branch line or some small division point, and was surprised and annoyed that the officer was unable to place his finger on the spot without a moment's hesitation. He knew the map by heart and could not understand why others did not know it equally well.

## A CHICAGO AMAZON.

Chicago, May 31.—Max Kirafine, a real estate dealer, went to one of his houses today to eject Flora Smith, a negress. But Flora refused to move.

Kirafine, it is charged, struck her on the head with a hatchet. The blade stuck in the woman's scalp. Flora blinked a moment, then, with the hatchet still sticking in her head, she kicked Kirafine down a flight of stairs to the street. Flora followed, and before he could rise seated herself on his body and drew the hatchet from her head as though it were a hatpin. She was beating him with the weapon when the police rescued him.

The fight caused so much excitement that a riot call for the police was sounded. Kirafine was arrested, and charged with assault to commit murder. The woman was taken to a hospital, where her condition is reported as serious.

## ROADS FORBIDDEN TO ADVANCE RATES

The Western Lines Restrained by United States Judge Dyer.

Hannibal, Mo., May 31.—Twenty-five western railroads were temporarily restrained tonight by United States District Judge David P. Dyer from enforcing or making a general advance in interstate freight rates, scheduled for June 1. The injunction was granted on a petition filed by the Government on the allegations that the advances in rates were agreed on by the defendants without competition and in violation of the Sherman act.

## SCORES KILLED IN ELECTION RIOTS

Budapest, May 31.—Terrible scenes have been witnessed during the Hungarian elections. Twenty persons were committed in different parts of the country, and 200,000 troops were called out to restore order.

## \$30,000 PRIZE IN NEW AERO FLIGHT

New York and St. Louis Papers Would Arrange Trip Between Those Cities.

New York, May 31.—Mayor Gaynor announced tonight on behalf of the New York World and the St. Louis Post-Dispatch a \$30,000 prize for a successful aeroplane flight from New York to St. Louis.

## OTTAWA HOT AFTER THE SPEED FIENDS

Automobile Scorchers at the Capital Fined for Exceeding the Limit.

Ottawa, May 31.—Seven more automobile owners were before the police court this morning charged with exceeding the speed limit. Two were fined \$30 and costs, and the other five warned. The police are waging active campaign against auto speeders, and within the past week have convicted a round dozen.

## HEARS WHISTLE SHRIEK; PLUNGES DOWNSTAIRS

Miss Alice Beam, Port Huron, Seriously Injured on Steamer Waukegan.

Port Huron, Mich., May 31.—The sudden blowing of the whistle on the steamer Waukegan Monday afternoon, is responsible for injuries to Miss Alice Beam, clerk in a local store, which may prove fatal. Miss Beam was returning from Tashmoo Park, and as the boat neared the landing here she was standing near the head of the stairway leading to the second deck. The whistle frightened her, and she fell to the bottom of the stairs, sustaining her death and several serious internal injuries. She is 18 years old.

## ENGLAND'S NEW COINAGE

Profile of King George Will Face Toward the Left.

London, May 31.—According to the mint authorities it will be some time before a new coinage is issued in England. When the task is undertaken the opinion of the president of the Royal Academy will be followed as to the most suitable design and it is hoped that something more artistic than the present coinage may be obtained.

When the new coins are prepared the profile of King George will face toward the left as on the coins of Queen Victoria. This is strictly in accordance with the old precedent that the heads of the Sovereign of England shall face alternately in successive reigns.

In the new postage stamps also this precedent will be followed. The question of the new stamps is now under consideration and competitive designs will be invited. According to stamp collectors Great Britain has never had a really artistic stamp.

## SEES BUMPER HARVEST.

Ottawa, May 31.—J. H. Grisdale, agriculturist at the Experimental farm, says that the rainfall of the past few days is of great benefit, owing to the fact that the seed became deeply rooted during the recent cold spell. He says the crops in the Ottawa district are advanced for this time of year, and predicts bumper harvests.

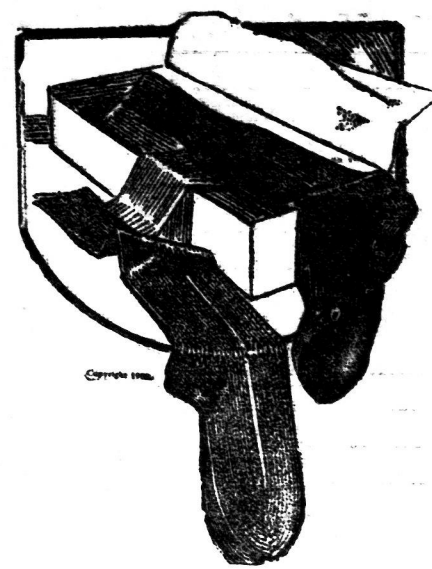
