FINE FIGHTING SPEECH BY LIBERAL LEADER AT BIG BELMONT MEETING

Shows That the Government Is Allied With the Liquor Business Against Temperance Interest.

WHITNEY'S CAMPAIGN AN ATTEMPT TO DISCREDIT "ABOLISH THE BAR"

Mr. N. W. Rowell, K.C., M.P.P., in his address to the electors at Belmont Thursday evening, arraigned the Whitney Administration for their failure to meet the proposals made by him in a frank manner, and also accused them of trying to beloud the issue in the campaign. In order that there should be no misunderstanding as to what his policy actually means, the portion of the speech referring to this question is given in full as follows:

The plank of the Liberal platform which William Sutherland, the independent candidate, has announced his intention of supporting is that of "Abolish the Bar." This very fact necessarily makes this the one outstanding and commanding issue in this contest.

SIGNIFICANT STATEMENT.

When I moved my resolution in the Legislature for the "Abolition of the Bar," I stated I knew the forces which would be arrayed against us in such a fight—that we would have opposed to us the best organized, strongest and most effective opposition that could possibly be brought forward, backed by all the money necessary, supplied by the liquor interests. We are now realizing the truth of this statement in this contest in East Middlesex.

When Sir James Whitney in speaking in the House in opposition to our policy of "Abolish the Bar," and in support of his own anti-treating policy, stated that:

"...within the last 48 hours it has been communicated to me by more than one man who is engaged today in the wholesale manufacture of ardent spirits, that they hope distinctly that legislation of this kind will be undertaken, because they want to see the treating habit destroyed."

No intelligent man could miss the significance and import of such a statement, or fail to realize the source from which the Government confidently expected to receive its strength and support.

THE MACHINE AT WORK.

Does anyone for a moment suppose that the Prime Minister and four other members of his Government, with five or six members of the Legislature, and at least four members of the Dominion Parliament are present in this constituency, which normally gives a substantial Conservative majority, solely for the purpose of preventing William Sutherland, an independent Conservative candidate, from filling out the balance of the term of his brother, the late Robert Sutherland? Does anyone for a moment suppose that the Conservative organization, headed by Mr. Birmingham, from Toronto, and manned throughout all the polling subdivisions of the riding, is here operating the political machine as it has never been operated before in East Middlesex, solely for the purpose of electing Mr. Neely, the Government candidate? Does anyone suppose that the liquor interests, with all the power and influence they can command, are allied with and supporting the Government in this contest simply to help swell the Government's majority in the House already so large as to be positively cumbersome?

WHITNEY'S ORDERS.

We all know that this combination of forces and influences—unprecedented, I believe, in the history of this province—is operating in this constituency for the purpose of defeating and if possible, discrediting our advanced temperance policy for the abolition of the bar. The word has gone forth, both from Queen's Park and from the liquor interests, that the man who stands up on our policy must be defeated, and the Government candidate, who opposes it, returned.

SOME BIG LESSONS.

We can learn some very important lessons from the situation in this riding:

First, the commanding importance of the issue we have raised;

Second, that the Government evidently believes the defeat of our policy to be vital to the continued existence of the Government;

Third, the Government and the liquor interests are combined together, working hand in glove to defeat our policy;

Fourth, they recognize that even such a combination cannot defeat us in a straight fight on the issue, and therefore throughout the whole riding the members of the Government and their supporters are dodging this question, and are seeking to divert the attention of the electors to other matters which are not an issue in this contest. They are seeking to discuss anything and everything except the "Abolition of the Bar."

Fifth, Conservative temperance men—men like Mr. Finch, chairman of the London Township Temperance Alliance, and others of like mind—are now realizing the character of the combination against us, and the real nature of the issue, and are rallying to our support.

ISSUE THE GREAT THING.

The issue is more important than candidates. It is bigger than party leaders. It is greater than party organizations. It touches the home, the family, the welfare of society and the state, and we know that in the end we must succeed.

Such a combination does not discourage us. We welcome it. We must locate our enemies before we can defeat them. This combination does not deter us one whit in the fight. It only makes us gird ourselves for a more strenuous struggle. It is a good thing that it has developed thus early in the contest throughout this province, because against such a combination and such an organization we now appeal in this constituency, and will appeal throughout the province to the honest, uncorrupted electorate, to men who put principle above party, who believe that the bar is a curse, and will unite with us to wipe it out.

I ask every Liberal elector in this riding, and every Conservative and Independent, who is opposed to the bar, to vote for our policy by voting for Mr. Sutherland on Monday next. Are you for the bar or against it? That is the question every elector must ask himself as he goes to the polls on Monday.

CATTLE AND PRODUCE MARKETS

LIVE STOCK.

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Cattle—Receipts, 2,500; market slow, steady. Beef steers, \$2.00 to \$2.10; Texas steers, \$1.90 to \$2.00; Western steers, \$2.00 to \$2.10; cows and heifers, \$1.75 to \$1.85; calves, \$1.50 to \$1.60; hogs—Receipts, 15,000; market mixed, steady. Light, \$5.00 to \$5.10; mixed, \$4.75 to \$4.85; heavy, \$4.50 to \$4.60; rough, \$4.25 to \$4.35; pigs, \$4.00 to \$4.10; bulk of hogs, \$3.75 to \$3.85; sheep—Receipts, 10,000; market steady. Native, \$3.00 to \$3.10; western, \$2.85 to \$2.95; lambs, \$4.00 to \$4.10; western, \$3.75 to \$3.85.

Union Stockyards.

TORONTO, Oct. 25.—Trade at the Union stockyards was less active yesterday than any day this week. The run, which was fairly heavy, consisted of light cattle for the most part, out of all portions to the demand, which is especially active for good heavy cows and feeders. The result was that some offerings were left over and prices were moved down on what was good for cattle. Better classed cattle remain steady in market values. While a few extra choice heifers sold at 6.25 per hundredweight, from \$6 to \$6.10 was given for good grades and from \$5.50 to \$6 was paid for good, \$5 to \$5.50 for medium and \$4 to \$4.50 for common. Good cows brought from \$4.50 to \$5.25, medium from \$4 to \$4.50, and common from \$3 to \$4. Butcher's calves ranged from \$1.50 to \$1.75, while feeding bulls brought \$2.50 to \$4.25. Cows were worth from \$1.50 to \$2.50. Heavy stockers and feeders were quoted at \$5.25 to \$5.70, with mediums at \$5 to \$5.50. Milkers and springers were unchanged, the market being good for them. Despite the heavy run the small meat market has maintained its strength and prices have held firm. The trade in hogs has absorbed receipts as they came in. Prices of hogs ranged from \$6 to \$6.25, light ones from \$5.75 to \$5.90, with a few choice at \$6. Hogs which are a little firmer, calves were at \$8 to \$9, with pigs at \$4 to \$4.50. Hogs remained firm, selling at \$8 to \$8.50, with roughs at \$6 to \$6.50, and \$5.50 to \$6 and western, \$5.25 to \$5.50. 28 cars, containing 100 cattle, 55 calves, 1,519 hogs and 52 sheep and lambs.

PRODUCE.

TORONTO, Oct. 25.—The local market is quiet for wheat. Very little Ontario offering. Values are lower for both wheat and corn, less in demand and firm. Flour is firmer, with price above export point. Oats are wanted. The demand for Ontario wheat is good, with offerings small, 90 per cent. values are quoted at \$1.10 to \$1.25, according to quality. Some imported wheat has determined price of the local market. Flour is quiet. Manitoba wheat demand is good from millers, but prices are easier. No. 1 new northern wheat at 95c, bay ports No. 2 at 90c and No. 3 at 85c, bay ports. Feed wheat, No. 2 new white and red wheat quoted at 85c to 90c, outside, and spotted, 80c to 85c, outside. Oats—Offerings small, with prices firm. No. 2 Ontario, 30c to 40c, outside, and No. 3 at 25c on track. Potatoes—No. 2 Ontario, 30c to 40c, outside. Western Canada oats 10c to 12c. Peas—Nominal. Trade is quiet, with offerings small. Beans—Offerings small, quoted at 60c outside. Corn—The market is dull and steady, with No. 2 old American quoted at 23c all rail, Toronto, and No. 3 at 22c all rail, No. 2 at bay ports, 68c. Hay—Offerings are increasing, with prices unchanged. No. 1 for 17c for No. 2, outside. Buckwheat—Prices are nominal at 12c outside. Bran—Manitoba, 10c to 12c, in bags, 7c. Potatoes—No. 1, 10c to 12c, in bags, 7c.
