Bigger Majority Than Was Expected, President Was Given Nomination by Republican Party on First Ballot.

MR. TAFT SECURES 561 VOTES COLONEL SENDS FINAL MESSAGE

Demonstration Started for Roosevelt Peters Out Without Doing Any Damage-Missouri Delegates Remain Silent During Taking of Ballot.

Chicago, Ill., June 23.-All Saturday the Taft steam-roller raced with the Sabbath. Once in a while it got snarled up with a challenging delegate or a roll call. Twice it ran over a buil moose that somehow or other got on the track. But taking the run as a whole it made express time and landed William Howard Taft, Republican candidate for President at 9.30 p.m. TAFT 561.

Two hours after that the steam-roller train crew were Belshazzaring at the Congress Hotel. The Taft bosses had counted on 560 votes on the first ballot. They had bettered their guess by one. The record was Taft 561. Roosevelt 107, LaFollette 41, Cummins 17. Present but not voting 344, absent 8 It was, therefore, an occasion for feasting.

LOTS OF FUN. The steam-roller was greatly assisted in making its schedule by the active encouragement of the onlookers, who rubbed their straw hats together to make a puffing noise, shouted "Toot, toot," and "All aboard," at the proper interval, and sang "Merrily, We Roll Along," as the engine of destruction hurled the mangled remains of the Roosevelt delegates to one side. The roller had a lovely day for the trip, clear sunshiny weather, and a moonlight night. It seems sad that nature should have been so gay when the Republican party was committing suicide, the national committee was receiving Its death blow, and Col. Theodore Roosevelt was getting butted violently in the rear. But, of course, everybody did not look at it that way, and the joy riding was unconfined.

CLEVER MR. ROOT.

Great credit is due to the driver of the steam-roller, Chairman Root, who is one of the eleverest men in the United States. He is far too elever to be President, so that is why they made him chairman of the national committee Chairman Root is so clever that the people would no more trust him than the say, would have trusted Talleyrand to be emperor. Whenever the steam-roller stuck Chairman Root was there with the axle grease. When he thought angry Roosevelt delegates would feel better for saying something he let them say it, even if he had to strain the rules. When the people wanted to stop and hurrah he let them hurrah, sometimes for twenty minutes. Anxmake time he never irritated the passengers by crowding them in the middle of a demonstration

Bill Bryan was an inspiration to every reporter pres ent, symbolizing as he did the chance a American newspaperman has of becoming President, the same chance that Horace Greeley had, and others I could mention. Bill Bryan left in the middle of the afternoon for Baltimore to run the convention there. He regards the meeting at Chicago as a mere overture to the big show at Baltimore, where be has the same kind of a fight on his hands as Roosevelt had here. 


Hero of Afghan War and Was And Will Seek To Have Conin Command at Ladysmith.

London, June 24. - Field Marshail Sir George Stuart White, governor of Chelsea Hospital, London's home for the labor leaders, were today held guilty tinguished soldiers in the British army, died today in his seventy-seventh year.

Sir George White, who was an Irishnan, having been born in County Anrim in 1835, passed through a strenuous life as a soldier fighting Britain's battles in all parts of the world. He vent through the terrible hardships in the Indian mutiny in 1857 as a young officer, taking part in many engagements with the rebels.
