HURON EXECUTIVE SHOWS PROGRESS

Evidences of Prosperity in Both
Spiritual and Financial
Matters.

The May Campaign To Be Held
the Second Sunday in
the Month.

At the meeting of the Diocese of
Huron executive held on Thursday
in Cronyn Hall, the report of the
Huron College jubilee fund received
much favorable comment from the
large number of members present.

Favorable comment was made on the
work of Rev. A. A. Bice, the agent,
whose efforts were responsible for the
splendid progress made. Other re-
ports were also presented, and all
showed excellent progress in the work
of the diocese. The meeting was dis-
missed at 1 o'clock.

Following the adoption of the min-
utes of the preceding meeting, a resolu-
tion was passed to appoint a commit-
tee to prepare a minute in regard to
the death of the late Rev. C. B. Ward,
M. A. of Essex. The bishop appointed
Revs. T. G. Wright and Arthur Carlisle.

Financial Reports.

Financial reports and that of the
lands and investments committee were
presented and evoked much favorable
criticism from the members. During
the reading of the lands and invest-
ments reports Dean Davis spoke of the
excellent securities held by the diocese
on both its investments in the west
and in Ontario. The report touched
briefly on the disposal of the Cham-
plain glee and the allocation of shares
to the churches along that city. The
amended report, putting the manage-
ment of the lands and investments
committee and allocation of shares in
the hands of a committee consisting
of Judges Holt, Barron and Roby, was
adopted.

Jubilee Fund.

The report of the Huron College
jubilee fund committee was adopted.
The bishop drew the attention of
the meeting to the question of the
Dublin charge, which was being look-
ed after by Rev. T. B. Charlton, of
Mitchell, and a grant of \$75 was made
to meet the necessary expenses incur-
red. A grant was also made to the
Munsey Indian Reserve, where val-
uable work is being carried on by Rev.
Mr. Rickard.

An application, which was made for
leave to sell certain lands in Eg-
phrasia, was granted under the con-
dition that the proceeds would be placed
at the disposal of the secretary-treas-
urer.

Tower for Grace Church.

The committee expressed approval
of a memorial in regard to the build-
ing of a tower to Grace Church,
Brantford, and also of a request for
the exchange of certain lands within
the municipality.

An application for a loan to mort-
gage the new church at Shelbourne to
the amount of \$4,000, was granted.

An application made for the super-
annuation of Rural Dean T. A. Wright
of Brantford, was regrettably received.
It was authorized under the canon.
The executive was dismissed at 1
o'clock following the reading of the
diocesan commissioner's report.

Those elected to the missions com-

mittee were: Rev. Dr. Fisher, Canon
Craig, Rev. C. R. Gunne, Messrs. E. G.
Henderson and John Crawford, Revs.
Charles Miles and Canon Davis and
Messrs. J. K. H. Pope and A. T. Nash.

At a meeting of the diocesan com-
mittee of the M. S. C. O. held on
Thursday afternoon, after the regular
meeting of the executive, it was de-
cided that the May campaign should
be held on the second Sunday in May
throughout the diocese, and that the
meetings of the rural deaneries be
held successively during the following
weeks.

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CASH BETTER SPENT ON THE PAVEMENTS

How \$700,000 Asked For Elec-
trification Could Be Used
To Help City.

If Applied to Paving, It Would
Lay Twenty-Three Miles
of Good Road.

**HOW MANY MILES OF REIN-
FORCED CONCRETE PAVE-
MENTS, MUNICIPALLY LAID,
COULD BE PUT DOWN FOR
THE \$700,000 THAT IT WILL
TAKE TO ELECTRIFY THE
LONDON AND PORT STANLEY
RAILWAY?**

That inquiry was made at The Ad-
vertiser office this morning. Worked
out rough figures, the answer would
be 23. In other words, with the \$700-
000 that is asked to electrify the Lon-
don and Port Stanley Railway as
many miles of concrete pavement, mu-
nicipally laid, could be constructed as
there are miles of right-of-way be-
tween London and the lake along the
L. and P. S. R.

Engineer's Figures.

This estimate is based on the figures
of the city engineering department
that is now engaged in laying rein-
forced concrete pavement on the 564
miles, or, in round figures, 7-12 of
a mile. This would work the cost per
mile out to approximately \$30,000. Al-
lowing a little margin for differences
in cost in various sections of the
city, this would mean 23 miles of con-
crete pavement that could be put down
for the same amount of money as is
to be thrown into the L. and P. S.

Assistant City Engineer H. A. Bra-
zier declared this afternoon that the
pavements could be taken as a fair ex-
ample of the cost in other sections of
the city.

Dealing with the question of what
the \$700,000 would do, it is admitted
that the pavements are not paid for out
of the general rate. Local improve-
ment taxes are levied against the prop-
erty that is benefited, and at the same
time these benefiting property-owners
are taxed for the work and have to
raise the \$700,000 required for these
pavements. The comparison has been
worked out to show just how much
could be accomplished with the amount
of money that some are willing to see
devoted to what has been characterized
as monumental folly.

A somewhat different comparison
would be the 25 miles of pavement that
the \$700,000 could make possible as
contrasted with the less than 15 miles
that is already laid. In the official city
year book for 1913 the number of miles
of paved streets—INCLUDING RE-
INFORCED AND GRAVEL
PAVEMENTS—is given at 13. Less
than two miles have been laid this
year, or authorized this year, and at
the outside there will be less than 15
miles of pavement at the end of 1913.

MACDONALD-JACKSON.

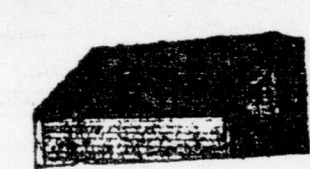
A very pretty wedding was sol-
