THE WILL OF THE NATION.

ROME, May 21, Via Paris, 5:30 p.m.—The Italian Senate unanimously adopted the following resolutions: "The Senate after having heard the declarations of the Government, affirming so plainly the will of the nation, proceeds to the voting of the bill."

STATE OF WAR EXISTS.

BRESCIA, Italy, May 21, via Paris—8:32 p.m.— The Austrians evidently consider that a state of war between the Dual Monarchy and Italy already exists. The Austrians have withdrawn their troops' and customs guard from the frontier at Ponte Caffaro and Lodrone after destroying the bridges, the telegraph and telephone lines and the electric light apparatus. Other bridges on the frontier have been mined.

From Ponte Caffaro and Lodrone two roads ass over the frontier and serve for communication between Italy and Austria.

AUSTRIANS TEAR UP RAILS.



ASSIGNEE SUES HIMSELF

Peculiar Case Tried at Osgoode Hall Chattel Mortgage.

[Canadlan Press.] Toronto, May 22.—A rather unique case was heard at Osgoode Hall when W. A. Cole, assignee of J. K. Paisley, sued himself as assignee of the Carleton Hotel Company. The plaintiff, as assignee of Paisley, and acting under the assignment act. furnished to himself, as assignee of the Carleton Hotel Company, an affidavit proving a total indebtedness of the company to the Paisley estate of \$17,215 under a chattel mortgage, and valued the security at \$13.000. As assignee of the company he disputes the claim purporting to impos on himself the necessity of bringing action or forfeiting his right to act as creditor, so he brought action against himself as assignee of the Paisley estate and set up that the notice he furnished himself was irregular.
