War Savings and Thrift Stamps...... 1,902,678

That constitutes 79 per cent of the net debt of Canada as at March 31, 1922.

Canada is in duty bound to meet that obligation, and to do so knowing that it is nothing in comparison to the sacrifice made by the thousands who never returned, and of the sufferings of the thousands who did go and came back.

Greek Situation at Paris Confab.

Geneva, Sept. 6 .- Contrary to the program, there was no meeting today of the League of Nations council or assembly. The scene of the Italo-Greek conflict has been transferred, Paris. Perhaps it was feared that shortage. the calling of the assembly of the league today would result in an outburst. M. Politis, the Greek representa-

tive, told the writer today that he has hopes of a settlement satisfactory to both Greece and Italy. "By the offers we have made," he said, "complete satisfaction is possible. The difference between the Italian and Greek views is that Italy wants a settlement through the use of force, while Greece wants to use legal channels to reach a settlement. Although the matter of indemnifying the families of the victims can. perhaps, be arranged by the ambassadors, there remains the political question of the occupation of Corfu. According to British journalists who have interviewed Premier Mussolini, the Italian motives and intentions give cause for anxiety."
