CONTINUE WORK TO REACH MINERS

**Jackson Rescue Crew Have
Still 125 Feet of Rock
To Blast.**

JACKSON, Cal., Sept. 12.—The rescue crew going through the muck-filled drift in the 360-foot level of the Kennedy mine completed 32 feet for the 24 hours ending today, of open space leading to the entombed men in the Argonaut mine, leaving 79 feet to go before the 50 feet of rock separating the two mines is reached. Soft muck, while offering little resistance, requires quick timbering to prevent its caving.

Four pounds of blasts have been fired in the 3,900-foot level of the Kennedy, two being shot during the night, making a total footage of 16 feet gained since yesterday, leaving 125 feet of solid rock to be penetrated before making the Argonaut's lower level.

BEGS TO STAY IN PRESENT HOME

**12-Year-Old Heiress To \$16-
000 Pleads To Remain
With Stepfather.**

**Grandmother Seeks Guardian-
ship of Annie Margaret
Given of Innerkip.**

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 12.—Annie Margaret Given, a 12-year-old heiress to \$16,000 left her by her father and mother, pleaded with the judge not to be separated from her stepfather and sister when the question of whom should be her legal guardian came up in surrogate court today. When James H. Given died in 1912 he left his daughter about \$15,000. The mother, later married Albert Yeo of Innerkip. Some months ago she died and left the daughter another \$1,000. The father's money was to be paid in three installments, the last when she had reached the age of 30. The income on this amount to be paid to the guardian to provide for maintenance and education. The child along with a stepmother has been living with Mr. Yeo at Innerkip since the mother's death.

In court today the grandmother, Mrs. Sarah Jane Mann of Innerkip, William Given of Millbrook, an uncle, and the stepfather, Albert Yeo, all applied for the guardianship of the child. On the case being opened, the application of William Given, the uncle, was thrown out on the ground that he was not a resident of Oxford. The case lasted all day and created much interest.

The grandmother charged that the stepfather was not kind to the girl. Albert Yeo denied that he was unkind to the child. The little girl told the judge that she wanted to stay with her stepfather and pleaded with him not to separate her from her stepfather and sister. She bore out the evidence given by the stepfather. Counsel for the grandmother pleaded a blood relation should have the child, but the judge disagreed and said the first consideration was the welfare of the child.

The judge reserved his decision.

**DRURY INSISTS ON
FULL AGREEMENT**
Will Not Approve Radial
Right-of-Way While Objec-
tions Continue.

TORONTO, Sept. 12.—Validation by the Ontario government of the agreement between the city of Toronto and the provincial hydro-electric power commission for a waterfront entrance of hydro radials into the city is dependent upon the city council's reaching an understanding with the other public bodies opposing the deal, or an affirmative vote of the ratepayers of Toronto.

Premier Drury makes this point clear in a letter which he sent today to Sir Adam Beck, who, as chairman of the commission, threw the whole weight of his influence into the recent prolonged debate in the city council and succeeded in getting that body to ignore the strong objections to the pact advanced by the harbor board, transportation commission and national exhibition board.

Premier Drury lays stress upon the fact that the present radial entrance scheme is different in important respects from that upon which Toronto ratepayers voted in 1916, involving several millions of dollars additional outlay and that, besides the three public bodies mentioned, a substantial minority of the city council voted in opposition to the plan.

RESIGNS POST IN DELORME PROBE

**Rene Faribault Sends Notice
of Withdrawal To Leopold
Houle.**

MONTREAL, Sept. 12.—The first break in the ranks of the sponsors of the petition to interdict Father Adelard Delorme developed today, when Rene Faribault, original representative of the "family council," resigned from the case.

Notice of Faribault's withdrawal was received this morning by Leopold Houle, counsel for Delorme. The advice further stated that Gustave Monette and Ephraim Filion, who represented Delorme when he was being tried for his half-brother's murder, will now carry the case entirely against their former client. Mr. Houle is reported to have sensational ammunition to burst when the hearing opens on Thursday. Asked today whether this was in the form of a certificate from Dr. Brochu, superintendent of the Beaufort Asylum, where Delorme was now lodged, Mr. Houle refused any information. 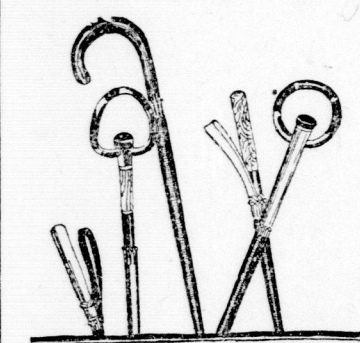

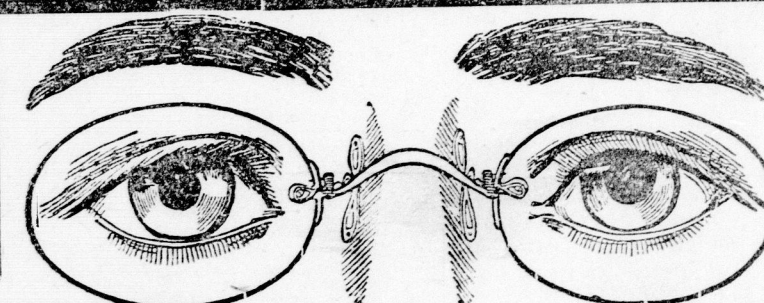
MONTREAL TO GET COAL BY WATER

MONTREAL, Sept. 12.—Montreal and New York will be the first cities to receive considerable shipments of anthracite coal from the Pennsylvania mines, and the first cargoes will reach here on Monday. This information was contained in private advices received here today. The coal will be borne by water from Oswego, N. Y. Car shipments will arrive later.

General optimism prevails here as regards the winter's supply being received. Montreal takes 25 per cent of Pennsylvania coal which is imported into Canada.
