LIBERALS WIN IN HALIFAX ELECTION

Loss Out in Lanark, R. F.
Preston Being Elected
Over David Findlay.

TOTAL POLL IS SMALL

Hon. Robert Finn Gains Re-
form Victory by 1,708
Votes.

Ottawa, Dec. 4.—(Canadian Press.)—Today's by-elections in Halifax and Lanark do not affect the party standing in the House of Commons. In neither of the constituencies is there any party change in the representation. At least there are no developments in the interval, next session will see a house technically divided exactly even, with a Liberal Speaker holding the casting vote. On one side—excluding W. J. Hammill of Muskoka, who recently renounced his allegiance to the Progressives—there will be 117 Liberals. On the other there will be 65 Progressives, 50 Conservatives and 2 Independent Liberals, or the combined opposition of 117 members.

Halifax, Dec. 4.—Hon. Robert B. Finn, Liberal, Halifax, who resigned as minister without portfolio in the Stoe Scott government to enter the federal arena, was elected today to represent the Halifax constituency in the Federal House by a clear majority of 1,708 over the combined votes of his Independent Liberal and Labor opponents, according to practically complete figures available at midnight tonight. With a total of 9,017 votes he led John J. Power, K.C., Independent Liberal, who polled 4,877, and James J. O'Connell, Labor candidate, with 3,243.

Today's total vote of 16,266, according to tonight's figures, is about 50 per cent of that polled in the general elections last year. There are about 55,000 names on the lists.

The campaign, in the absence of a Conservative candidate, involved no party issue and did not arouse great public interest.

LANARK GOES CONSERVATIVE.
Perth, Dec. 4.—(By Canadian Press Staff Correspondent.)—Lanark remains in the Conservative column by a majority which promises to be more than 1,400 when all the votes are in. R. F. Preston (Conservative), formerly minister without portfolio in the Ontario government, was returned victor over David Findlay (Liberal) after one of the most strenuous by-election contests staged since the general election of 1918. The Conservative victory was a result of the strenuous ever staged in Lanark County.

The urban sections, namely, Carleton Place, Smith's Falls, Perth and Almonte, went Conservative by large majorities, as also did some of the rural areas. The majority tonight almost cuts in half that rolled up by the Conservative candidate in 1921.

The railway vote in Smith's Falls, which was looked upon as one of the key factors in the final result, was strongly in favor of Dr. Preston, as also was the vote in Carleton Place, the home of both candidates.

CALL MEETING OF BAPTIST PASTORS

Council Will Consider Advisability of Setting Aside
E. J. Davis for Ministry.

A meeting of pastors and delegates from the Baptist churches of Lambton and Middlesex is being held in Talbot Street Baptist Church this afternoon and evening. The meeting this afternoon deals with the setting aside for the Baptist ministry of E. J. Davis, who was granted a license to preach by the Talbot Street Church. He, with his wife and little child, intend leaving shortly for the China mission field, going under the auspices of the Chinese Inland Mission.

Talbot Street Church issued a call to all Baptist churches in Middlesex and Lambton Association to send their pastors and two delegates to form a council to consider the advisability of setting aside Mr. Davis for the gospel ministry. Provided they recommend that he be accepted, the ordination services will take place this evening at 7:30.

The sermon will be delivered by Dr. Green of Talbot Street Church; the prayer of ordination will be given by Rev. Mr. Stevens of the China Inland Mission, and the charge to the candidate by Rev. Mr. Johnston of Calvary Baptist Church, Toronto. The welcome to the Baptist ministry will be extended by Rev. Dr. Sowerby of Malvern Baptist Church.

Mr. Davis saw service overseas, and it was while in the army that he decided to enter the ministry. He has since been from the Moody Bible School at Chicago, and while studying there was acting pastor of a Baptist church in that district. During his stay in London he, as well as Mrs. Davis, have endeavored themselves to the people of Talbot Street Church.

WATFORD PAYS HONOR TO FORMER PASTMASTER

John White, Who Died in Swift Current Buried Under Masonic Auspices.

Watford, Dec. 4.—The funeral of John White, postmaster at Swift Current, Sask., was held yesterday afternoon from the residence of Dr. Hamilton, St. Clair street, and was very largely attended.

Rev. H. V. Workman, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, officiated at the religious services, both at the house and at the cemetery.

The funeral arrangements were under the auspices of Havelock Lodge, A. F. & A. M., with Worshipful Master Alfred Hood in charge. The Masonic services were conducted by the D.D.G.M. Richard Williamson son of Watford, assisted by the officers of Havelock Lodge.
