

ANNUAL SYNOD OF HURON OPENS

MOVE SPREADING TO HAVE M'KENNA DUTIES REPEALED

Chancellor Snowden Shows No Sign of Weakening in Determination to Act.

SEELEY AMENDMENT

London, May 12.—The agitation against the repeal of the McKenna duties is being continued by the politicians, manufacturers, affected workers and the hostile press, in view of the debate in parliament tomorrow, when Stanley Baldwin's motion of censure will occupy the house. Mr. Snowden, the chancellor of the exchequer, today is receiving a delegation appealing on behalf of 30,000 motor trade workers for retention of the duties, but he has shown no sign of weakening in his determination to sweep away the duties on Aug. 1, in accordance with his budget announcement.

To Mr. Baldwin's motion, Major-General Seeley, Liberal, plans to move an amendment, proposing that two years' notice be given before duties are abrogated. This is likely to have the support of a section of the Liberals and perhaps some laborites, but all indications are that the government will come through triumphantly, although its majority may be comparatively small.

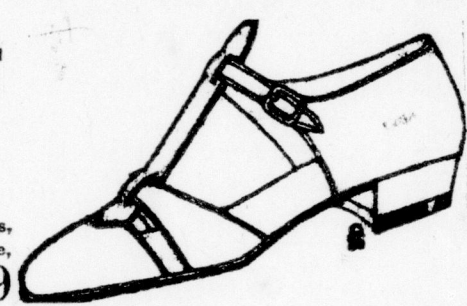

BUDGET VOTE IS EXPECTED TO BE TAKEN THURSDAY

That Resolution Will Carry by Large Majority Is Foregone Conclusion.

CHURCH UNION BILL

Ottawa, May 11.—The long, lingering debate on the budget ends this week on Thursday night, unless there is further intervention with the present plans. The debate this year has not been productive of much excitement, although the last few days may see some livelier episodes should both the prime minister and the leader of the opposition, as is likely, enter the lists. That the budget resolution will be carried by a large majority is, however, accepted as a foregone conclusion. Last year the government had to face the opposition not only of Conservatives but also of the main body of the Progressives, and was able to carry the main budget motion with a majority of only eight. This year, as has been indicated by Robert Forke, Progressive leader, Progressives will vote with the government, thus insuring the passing of the budget, although there will be a few dissensions on the government side.

The Labor amendment is not expected to receive much support from the north side of the House, but it is rather outside the House itself that the chief interest lies. Day after day the railway committee room has been crowded for the battle over church union. Formal hearings on the preamble of the bill have closed. There now remains discussion by members of the committee before the vote on the preamble and consideration of the bill's provisions in detail. The general impression, apparently, is that the preamble of the bill will be adopted, although amendment of some of the clauses is probable. A number of amendments are stated now to be under discussion.

In a double sense the Home Bank crash will be under discussion the coming week. On Tuesday the banking and commerce committee opens inquiry into banking inspection.

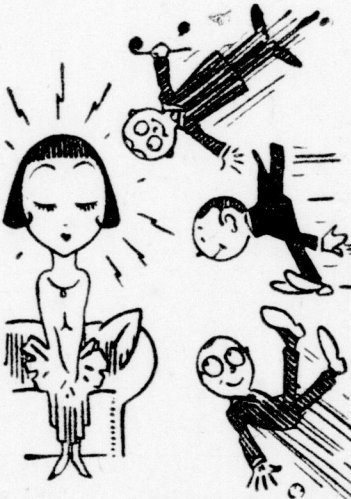
C. N. DIVISIONAL MEETING IS BEING HELD TODAY

The congregation expressed their appreciation of their pastor's work with them by extending to him a unanimous invitation to remain for another year.

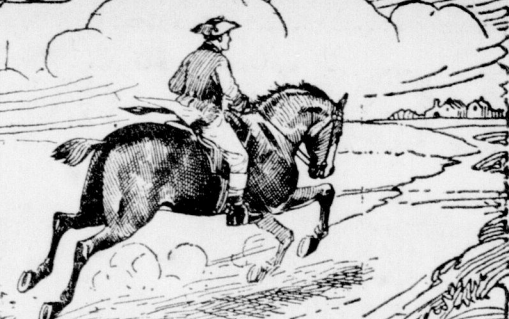

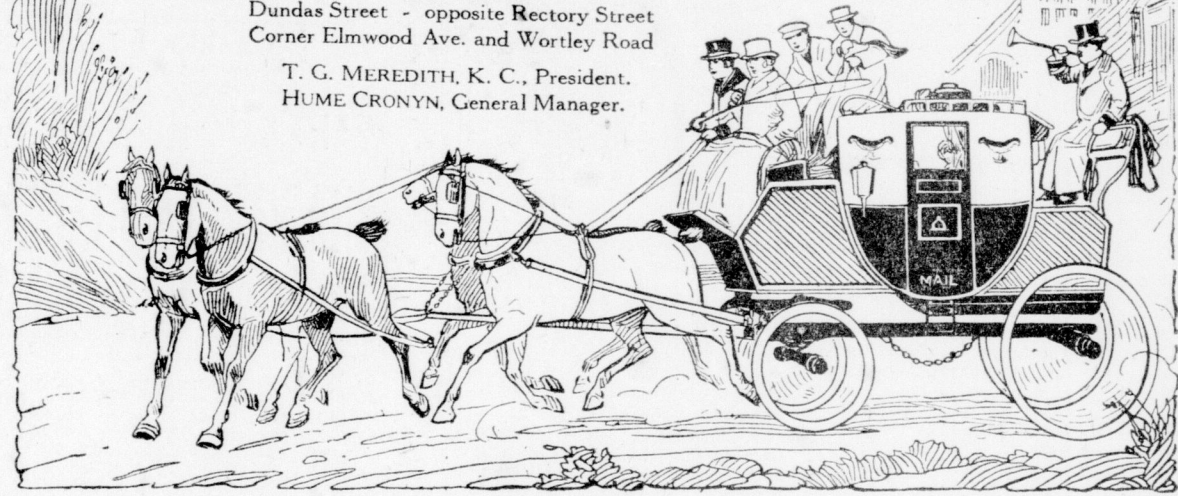

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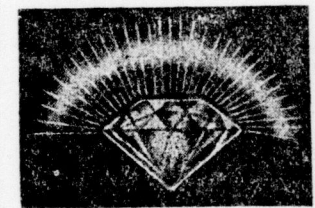
