Municipality Joins The Hydro Electric Railway Union

Town Must Make Allowance on Corner Lot Local Improvement Assessments

At a special meeting of the Town Council held last evening a by-law was passed declaring it desirable to construct certain sidewalks, which were reported on by the Town Engineer at a previous meeting, under the provisions of the local improvement Act. All members except Councillor Weiler supported the motion.

Councillor Bohlender queried as to whether the Council could take up the matter of having these works constructed by day-labor.

The Clerk pointed out that this could be done after the work had been advertised and the by-laws for each sidewalk read and passed.

The Town is now a member of the Hydro Electric Railways Union. Acting on a communication from the Union it was decided on the motion of Councillor Bohlender and Deputyreeve Kutt to join the organization. The annual membership fee is \$10.00.

Phone Service

The notification of the Bell Telephone Company that they would have to discontinue giving the Corporation the use of two phones gratis owing to an order by the Municipal Board that all services charges must be accounted for.

The communication was laid over for future consideration.

Charles Street Sidewalk

A petition from property-owners for a sidewalk on the west side of Charles Street from Erb Street north for a distance of 264 feet was referred to the Town Engineer for report.

Requests for Rebates

Messrs. Snyder Brothers' Upholstering Co., Ltd., and Messrs. Reitzel Brothers in a communication requested the Council to allow them the rebate of taxes agreed to by previous Councils for a number of years. In the first case the last year according to the Council's agreement in 1906 would be 1916.

In view of the fact that previous Councils had made the agreement Reeve Wogenast, Deputyreeve Kutt, Councillor Hallman and Mayor Kaufman thought that there was reason for granting the request.

Councillors Bohlender and Stroth took exception to the proposal if it were illegal. Reeve Wogenast was about to move that the refund be made but in view of the pleading of Councillor Weiler for unanimity he withdrew his motion.

Councillors Bohlender and Stroth moved that the Town Solicitor be requested to report on the legality of the question of refunding taxes and to be present at the next meeting.

On Dangerous Ground

Councillor Bohlender referred to the proposal at the last meeting of the town assuming a share of the cost of local improvements in front of corner lots. "What about those people who have been paying on corner lot improvements for the past few years?" he asked.

The Reeve remarked that the principle was the same as in the case of the permanent roadways. To make a change might be going on dangerous ground.

"If it's dangerous ground, I think we'd better stay off," said Councillor Bohlender.

Traffic Committee

Deputyreeve Kutt wanted to know what the Committee on a traffic By-law had done.

Councillor Hallman replied that information from other centres had been secured and could be put into shape if the Committee met.

Stone at Yards

The Deputyreeve also drew attention to the work of breaking the stone at the corporation yards, which was passed by the Council. In reply to the Mayor, Councillor Hallman, chairman of the Board of Works, stated that he

would take up the matter.

School Bylaw

The \$5000 bylaw providing for a new heating and ventilating system in the Central School was read a first and second time.

Shorter Periods for Debentures

The Town Clerk drew the attention of the Mayor and Council to the custom which is becoming more and more general of towns issuing debentures for local improvements for shorter periods. Under the law the cost of repairs had to be borne by the town during the lifetime of the debentures. Therefore it was desirable to have the debentures for a short period rather than for a long. In the case of sidewalks there wasn't as much repair work as there was on permanent roadways. Consequently the cost of the latter was bigger than in the case of the former.

Reeve Wogenast considered that for sidewalks the debentures might well be fixed at twenty years.

Councillor Bohlender considered it an advantage for the property-owners if he could pay off the debt in a shorter period of years because he would save the interest.

The Reeve, however, remarked that many persons preferred a smaller annual payment for a longer period.

Must Make Allowance

Town Solicitor McBride in response to the Council's request at a previous meeting was present and gave his opinion on the question of the Town assuming a share of the cost of local improvements in front of corner lots.

He stated that an allowance had to be made according to the amendment to the law; this had to be decided in every case; no particular rule could be applied; but the Town Engineer had to use his judgment.

The following paragraph of the local improvement act, section 24, (1) was read by the Solicitor:

"In the case of corner lots and triangular or irregularly shaped lots situate at the junction or intersection of streets a reduction shall be made in a special assessment which otherwise would be chargeable thereon sufficient, having regard to the situation, value and superficial area of such lots as compared with the other lots, to adjust the assessment on a fair and equitable basis."

The Solicitor pointed out that the Engineer should make an allowance, and fix the assessment. If the owners were dissatisfied they could appeal to the Court of Revision who would either sustain or amend the assessment.

All members of the Council were present.

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What Happened in Preston

All the Latest News From the Wire

(By Staff Reporter)

PRESTON, Ont., June 30th, 1915.

Jacob Ingold, it was learned to-day, was consulting with his counsel with a view of pending action against Mr. C. R. Miller, Inspector of the Waterloo County Children's Aid Society for having taken into custody his daughter as a vagrant, without sufficient reason for having done so.

Mr. Ingold in an interview, said that if his daughter was inclined to be wayward and if it came to the attention of Inspector Miller he considered it to be the first duty of the Inspector to have notified the father of the girl.

Another laud was added to the Preston Car and Coach Co., in having received the order and completed the first radial cars for the Hydro Electric Power Commission on their first line between London and Port Stanley.

The first shipment was made last night and consisted of two steel cars and three trailers. This new line opens on Dominion Day and it was necessary to work the staff all night in order to complete the cars but, as usual, they were on time.

This firm is also very busy at present on other orders for Canadian Railways.

In the official casualty list issued in this morning's daily papers are the names of two Prestonians who met death in defence of Empire. They

are Jas. Reid and Arthur Arber. Reid was going to the front Arber was employed for two years with the Metal Shingle and Shingling Co. He was a native of Warrington, Eng., and as far as known, has no relatives in this country. He was 22 years of age.

Reid is also a native of England and came to Preston from Petrolia and had been in this country 6 years, and had been in Preston only six weeks when the war broke out. He was with the first contingent with the first soldier from Canada to fall at the front.
