Big Minneapolis Co. Will Have Large Storehouses at Head of Navigation.

MUTINEERS SENTENCED

WINNIPEG, Aug. 7.—The Free Press has learned on the very best authority that the Peavy people will erect a string of elevators along the lines of the Canadian Northern railway.

Representatives of the Peavy company have been traveling through western Canada by daylight for the past three months, with the object of ascertaining the best grain areas and finally picking out the Canadian Northern road as they considered that the line passed through the most fertile part of the whole country, and because it had the additional attraction of not being occupied by other grain interests.

The Swan River valley and the Carrot River valley districts will be first intruded, as they considered these sections the richest parts of the Canadian west from an agricultural standpoint.

ADVANTAGES OF ESQUIMALT.

Captain of the Indians Compared Dock Dues With Those Elsewhere. Captain H. K. Struve of the steamer Esquimalt, which is at present in the Esquimalt drydock undergoing cleaning and slight repairs, is at the Esquimalt. In conversation with a Colonist reporter last evening, Captain Struve was asked the reason why Esquimalt had been chosen. He stated that it was very difficult to get even slight repairs done on the Pacific in any place other than Esquimalt, and he also stated that the cost was much greater. A comparison was made between the cost of a fortnight's dockage for the Indians against that of the German steamer Maricheu, which occupied the Esquimalt dock from June 8 until yesterday, exactly two months. The dockage bill for his boat was the highest that has been there, that it costs more for a fortnight's dockage in one of the government docks on the Pacific Coast controlled by the United States government than it does for two months' dockage in a Canadian government dock.

King, whose time is fully occupied in answering inquiries by visitors concerning fruit and fruit growing. The exhibit is especially attractive to Brandon people, as so many have relatives or friends interested in fruit growing in British Columbia. There is no doubt that the industry is making big strides, and Manitoba has a large number of growers of such fruit as shown at this exhibition.
