MADAGASCAR AND FRANCE.

BARBAROUS PRAUTICES BY LIGIOUS FANATICS.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., March 25-The nnual of Hermano's penitents' fana-

tical religious ceremonies began at Los

Griegos this morning. Thirty men and women formed in line and began the process of purification. Five men were naked to the waist, barefooted, and wearing black robes and hoeds, which concealed their dentity. The master of the ceremonies carried a cat-o'-nine-tails. Two huge wooder crosses weighing 250 pounds were placed on the naked shoulders of two of the selftorturers. The sharp edges out into the flesh and caused blood to spurt out and drop to the ground. One penitent produced a harp goad, which he thrust into the flesh

sharp goad, which he thrust into the flesh of his fellow sufferers from time to time, while the procession marched up the street to a wild chant in Spanish. Halting once, crosses were transferred to the other shoulders, the attendants applying raw-hide whips mercilessly, each blow taking off skin and bits of flesh. The procession took its way to a goal half a mile away. Not a groan was heard or a word spoken. The ceremony is termed the Path of Thorns.

As the procession reached the goal, which was an adobe hut, they were compelled to cross with bare feet a space thickly strewn with the cacti plant. One of the cross bearers hesitated, when half a dozen whips descended on his bare shoulders, and with a bound he sprang into the cacti tracks, every step and those of his followers being marked with blood. As the proceedings grew more terrible the chant grew louder and the thongs fell with more vigor. Reaching the door the party was lost sight of, a sentinel guarding the entrance, and only broken whips and pools of blood bear witness to what transpired within. Issuing from the bouse the procession returned to the house of worship. The horrifying exercises continued, one batch of penitents succeeding another until night, when a grand procession and chant wound up the exercise for the day. During the marches to and from the house of refuge the scene at times was tao sickening for description. Powerful men submitted their bodies to the most merciless flagellation, until in some instances their muscles were seen quivering at every blow. The whole proceeding was a savage attempt to honor the Easter season.
