It has been computed that there are six thousand houses in the City of Toronto where one and only one girl is employed in the capacity of general servant. In addition to these there is a large number of houses where two or more domestics are employed.

Of late there has been a serious demand on the part of labor unions and labor advocates that no workman or workwoman shall be compelled to work more than six days a week. The movement is very strong, and it is quite possible that bylaws will be passed not only not compelling seven days' labor, but not even permitting it. The labor unions in their demand for six days' labor have the almost unanimous support of the clergy of the city, the Protestant portion at any rate. Several prominent clergymen have already admonished their congregations to see to it personally that the law of six days' labor and one day's rest is effectively carried out, as being right not only from a humanitarian standpoint, but because the law was given to men by God himself.

The Servants' Relief Association (Ltd.) is organ-

The Servants' Relief Association (Ltd.) is organ-ized to meet the changed conditions of domestic hired help that are now on the eve of being intro-

ized to meet the changed conditions of domestic hired help that are now on the eve of being introduced.

The Association will have its head office down town, with a branch office east, west, north and northwest.

The Association will provide families with well-trained girls to relieve their own servants one day each week. These girls will be guaranteed as faithful, competent and of good address. Each one of the Association's girls will relieve six families during the week, and she will be confined to this circle of families so as to ensure as little friction as possible between mistress and servant.

The promoters of the Association recognize that a scheme of this kind can be more economically and beneficially carried out in the method described than by "relief" girls undertaking the work on their own account.

The promoters expect at least 600 families will become patrons of the Association as soon as it begins business. This will necessitate the employing of 100 girls. It is expected in a short time, just as soon as the working of the Association is thoroughly understood, that the Association will employ at least 1000 girls.

The Association can hire girls for this purpose at \$10 a month, and by making its rate only 50 cents per week for each family the Association would realize a profit of \$2 per month on each girl, or \$200 for 100 girls, or \$1000 a month for 500 girls. It is expected, however, that the Association can easily get 60 cents per day for each of its girls, which will just double the receipts as estimated above.

The Association will be organized under the Joint Stock Companies' Act of the Province, with a capital of \$20,000. There will be 200 shares at \$100 per share. Shares will be sold at par, but it is thought that immediately after the organization of the Association they will jump above par.
