ENTRANCE AND FIFTH CLASS EXAMINATIONS.

The following is the result for East Lambton Inspectorate. Sixty-two per cent. of the candidates were successful. \$8 per cent. from urban schools and 52 per cent. from rural schools were successful.

Entrance.

While some of the Entrance papers were a little more difficult than usual, the examination as a whole was considered by the Board of Examiners to be a fair test of a candidate's fitness to take up High School work. The failures were chiefly in arithmetic, geography and the total. The total required to pass is 300 marks or sixty per cent. of the marks given. Those who obtained 75 per cent. have passed with honors. The names of successful candidates at each centre are given in order of merit.

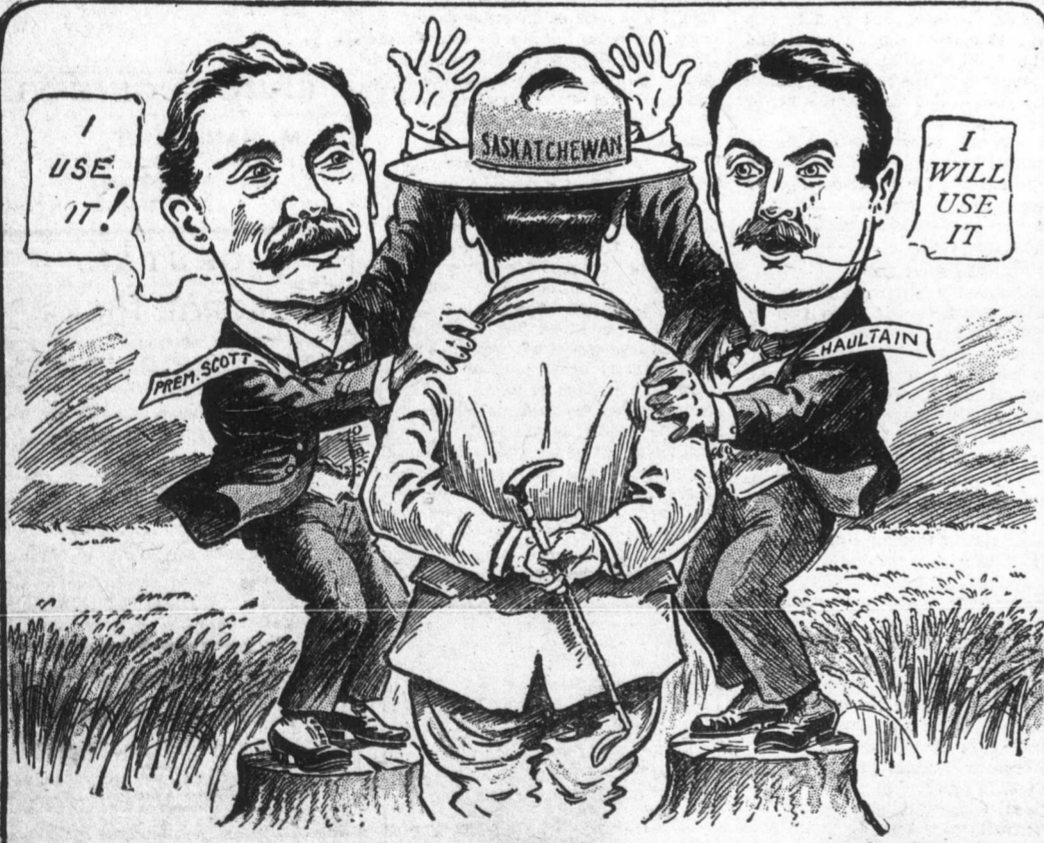
