



traveller gets a view of Kibo, 19,000 feet high, the loftiest summit of Kilimanjaro. It is an extinct volcano, crowned with the dazzling splendour of perpetual snow. Since Bishop Tucker's visit trouble has occurred with the Germans. The local chief Mandara died, and

his son foolishly attacked the Germans, who—wrote the resident church missionary, the Rev. A. R. Steggall, on May 31—are likely to attack Taveta, and Mochi also, with their Nubian soldiers.

"The mission station at Mochi is in the ter-

race platform of Chagga, which lies below the southern slope of the volcanic moun-tains. On February 20th, Bishop Tucker baptized here two native boys. The station stands at an elevation of 3,700 feet above the level of the sea, and has a delightful climate, the thermometer rarely going beyond eighty-four degrees. Bracket ferns and black-berries, with maidenhair ferns, convolvuli, verbenas, and heliotropes make the country look like England. We give the Bishop's sketch of the church at Mochi where
