### MONEY MARKET.

THE demand for discounts has been very slight owing to the inactivity in business circles. Sterling Exchange remains at last week's quotations. Gold drafts on Now York are in little demand, and transactions have been at 1 to 2 yer cent discount.

The upward tendency of gold in New York has continued, and it has now reached 144? The future of gold is receiving the attention of the leading commercial papers in the United States, and there is considerable anxiety manifested respecting the manner in which importers shall meet their future European liabilities.

The agreement of Ontario merchants respecting a discount of ten per cent, on small, and four per cent on large silver, has been more generally adopted Brokers here charge 4; per cent, discount, and are selling at 4;.

DUSINESS during the week has been confined principally to the satisfying of merely local requirements, and, of course, a great deal of activity has not prevailed. A few morchants from the West have been in, and though purchases are not large, still a fair business is anticipated and preparations made accordingly.

Teas.—The demand for teas has not been so good during the past week as in general. Cheap Japans have been enquired for. In Greens there has been erry little demand, and prices remain about the same. There is but a small stock of high grades and mediums and arrivals are sufficient only for common requirements. Under these circumstances holders do not care about selling at present quotations. Blacks and Trankays are in good demand, and prices are unchanged.

COFFEE-Is in slight demand, with no change of prices.

FRUT-Continues in good demand, but there is no important change in prices. Layer Raisins and Valentias will find a ready sale.

Rick—The better qualities of Rice are wanted, and could obtain full figures. We have no alterations from last week's quotations.

SPOAR.—There is a good demand for bright samples, which bring full rates, though the demand for ordinary is rather easier. There is less request for Barbadoes and Cubas.

Molasks.—Good demand, and prices fully maintained Good Clayed is now held for 32c to 53c. Muscovade, 37c to 40c. Stocks are light, but rousiderable quantities are to arrive soon.

SALT—There is nothing doing in Salt it is held principally in store at 70c7 every arrival is taken off the wharf at 680.

Srives - Very little activity in Spices, and we do not change quotations.

Only a light demand is however anticipated in the early part of the season, especially for heavy goods, as considerable stocks of this class were held over from last year, and owing to the dry season sales have not been as good as usual. A good demand is confidently looked for later.

Stocks of coarse goods now manufactured, are lighter than at the same period last year.

## MONTREAL PRODUCE MARKET.

LOUR.—During the greater part of the week prices continued without quotable variation, but smaller receipts and gradually diminishing stock have, despite the reported decline in Britain, induced greater firmness and some advance in leading grades towards the close. Strong Super has become very scarce, and rates ranging up to \$7.25, and in some cases more have been paid. City and Welland Canal brands from \$6 40 to \$6.59, have crept up to \$6.60 to \$6.70. The advance in the lower goods has been but partial, owing to the supply being at present in excess, while the higher grades have undergone no change, the supply being ample, and demand, as hitherto, restricted to the merest retail. Bags-In sympathy with strong brands, have advanced, \$3.45 being secured for strong towards the close. There is however, a wide range according to strength, &c., some low ground, though white, going under \$3.

OATMEAL—Is in small supply, and rates obtained are very irregular Commeal—Continues neglected; nominal rate for Western kiln-dried \$4.15 to \$4.25.

GRAIN—Wheat has become scarce, and a carload or two of U. C. Spring recently changed hands at \$1.57). The stock is now in one or two hands, and held firmly for some advance. A few parcels of white wheat have latterly come to market, and been pressed, but finding little favour, a unparatively low rates have been accepted. A carload sold within a day or two at \$1.50. Pease—Are scarce, and the few straggling cars that offer fetch \$1.10 to \$1.15 for \$3 lbe., according to sample Coarse Grains—May be considered quite nominal, none but retail lots changing hands.

PROVISIONS .- Pork-We have little business to note, and but partial variation in value. The recent Western arrivals of Mess have tended to arrest the upward movement in that grade. Former rates rule, but the transactions are restricted to the limited consumptive wants; though the demand for the other grades is restricted, holders are for the most part firm and gradually advancing their pretensions as the season wears on, bringing them nearer the consumptive demand attending the fall shipping. Cutmeats continue in limited supply and command full previous rates. Lard is very scarce, and exceptional rates are obtained for the few packages changing hands. Tallow for the same reason commands rates that nothing but temporary scarcity justify. Butter-Receipts are trifling, and the market has become almost bare of every description, enabling the few holders to exact extreme rates for anything estable; as however, there is a return of temperate weather, awaiting which several parcels have stood ready to be forwarded, we may look for fair supplies, and some modification in existing prices.

Ashes.—The recent competition, or rather contest, (for each a little rivalry in the ashes market usually becomes) has in a great measure ceased, and most of the late advance in Pets has been lost, the market closing quiet at \$5.65 to \$5.70 for firsts, \$4.85 to \$4.95 for seconds, and \$4.45 for thirds. Pearls engage little attention, though from the smallness of receips, and the existing stock being mostly in the hands of speculators, late rates are more readily obtainable.
