OUR LADY OF THE SNOWS."

Queen Margharita of Italy-whose strong devotional tendencies, and whose predilection for the Alpine residency, where she is a constantly familiar and interpid explorer, are well-known-has long entertained the wish that one of the great mountain peaks should be crowned with a statue of the Holy Virgin. Under her auspices, and aided largely by her purse, the project has now been realized, the summit of the Rocciamelone Peak, which is 10,500 crest high, and is eternally capped with snows, having just been surmounted by a colossal status of "Our Lady of the Snows," sculptured by the famous Sturil, of Turin, and cast in bronse. The pedestel of this great work, which is 25 feet in height, bears in Latin the inscription written by the Peps 10, Mother of God, more pure thas the snows, take into the processor this land of Italy."
