duces perfect therapeutic results, such and noted with Ergo-Apiol (Smith, in insane women, may be expected to perform the same services even more promptly in the average case of ame norrhea as met with in ordinary family practice. This is proved conclusively in the numerous cases reported by various observers who employed Ergo-Apiol (Smith) in menstrual disorders, and a partial list of whose publications appear in the annexed bibliography.
