

## FOR 57 YEARS IT HAS SERVED US WELL, NOW WHAT?

Even then, by 1978 it was realized that new quarters to house the entire staff would soon be needed and consequently the property on Pennsylvania Ave. was purchased — thus giving Canada the unique status of being the only foreign embassy given a spot on the otherwise all-American two-kilometer grand route linking the Capitol and the White House.

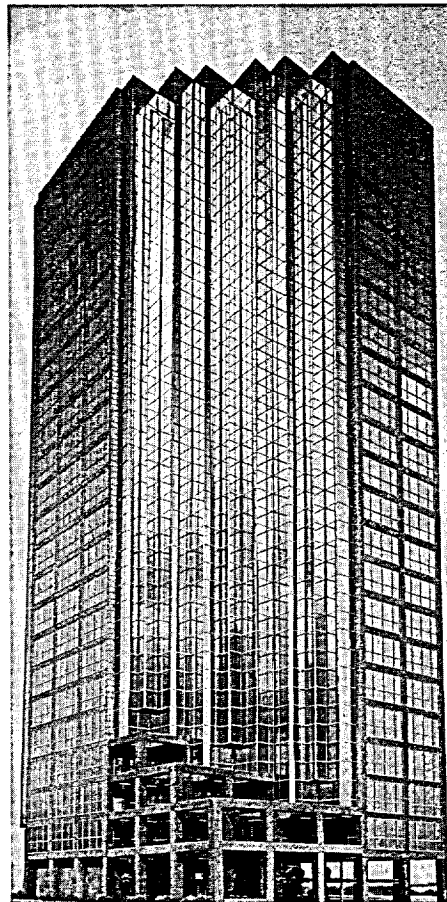
Last December, the design for the new Canadian Chancery in Washington D.C. was one of eight selected from 168 entries to receive the 1984 Award of Excellence.

## OTHER PROJECTS IN THE UNITED STATES

The major activity in the United States is the proposed new chancery in Washington, D.C. Numerous other lesser-known projects are also, however, in the planning stages, underway or have just been completed. These include:

**Dallas** — in January 1984 the chancery was relocated onto the 17th floor of St. Paul Tower, a commercial building in the downtown core. In **Boston** we are in the process of moving into Copley Place (a large Rideau Centre like complex) located in the heart of Boston. At the present time the area is being sectioned into office space to accommodate the 13 Canada based and the 26 locally engaged staff. The "fittings" should be completed by the end of the summer and the chancery functional shortly thereafter. In **New York**, the Consulate General is being renovated to occupy two floors rather than one and the Canada Room is being refurbished.

In terms of residences there is activity in five cities. In **Cleveland**, a new official residence has been purchased; in **New York**, a second apartment upstairs was joined to the existing official residence by means of a circular staircase; in **Philadelphia** an adjacent apartment has been leased and the walls removed between the two; in **Washington** a new residence for our Ambassador to the OAS has been identified and in **Buffalo** an offer has been made on an official residence, contingent upon Treasury Board approval.
