

CHAPTER XXVII

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Chapter XXVII of the Constitution of the United States of America, which is the last chapter of the original Constitution, deals with the powers of the President and the Vice President. It is divided into four sections, which are numbered 1 through 4.

Section 1 of Chapter XXVII states that the President and Vice President shall hold their offices for a term of four years. It also provides that the President shall be elected by the electors in each State, and that the Vice President shall be elected by the electors in each State, together with the President.

Section 2 of Chapter XXVII states that the President shall be the Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and shall have the power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment. It also provides that the President shall have the power to make treaties, provided that two-thirds of the Senators present concur.

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
