4, 5 and 6. Fire brick, containing not less than ninety per cent of silica; magnesite or chrome fire brick; and other fire brick valued at not less than one hundred dollars per thousand, rectangular-shaped, the dimensions of each not to exceed one hundred and twenty-five cubic inches, for use exclusively in the construction or repair of a furnace, kiln or other equipment of a manufacturing establishment, are free of customs duty.

Fire brick, not otherwise provided for in the tariff, for use exclusively in the construction or repair of a furnace, kiln or other equipment of a manufacturing establishment, is subject to duty at the rates of 10 per cent, British preferential tariff; 12½ per cent intermediate tariff; 15 per cent general tariff.

Other fire brick manufactured of clay, building brick and paving brick manufactured of

clay or cement, are dutiable at the rates of 12½ per cent British preferential tariff, 20 per cent intermediate tariff, 22½ per cent general tariff.

There has not been any increase in the rates of duty on imported brick since September 1, 1930.
