PRESENCE IN GALLERY OF SECRETARY GENERAL OF UN CONFERENCE ON HUMAN SETTLEMENTS AND HABITAT '76

Mr. Oberle: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a question of privilege. In response to my question during the question period concerning a report commissioned by the Department of Consumer and Corporate Affairs with a private firm, the minister, I am sure inadvertently, is reported in *Hansard* as saying that the report has not yet been received by his department. My information is that indeed the report has been received by his department.

My concern is twofold. Firstly, the minister might wish to set the record straight and admit that the report has been received by his department. Secondly, if it has been received and he is not aware of it, then because of the importance of the survey that was conducted he might wish to correct this discrepancy within his department and bring the report to the attention of the House of Commons and the public.
