Judge Denton Tells Grand Jury of Change Which Has Come About.

FIRE ESCAPES

Needed at House of Providence-Jurors Liked Cuelph Prison Farm.

In their report presented to Judge Denton yesterday afternoon, the grand fury of the criminal assize court expressed appreciation of the methods employed at the Guelph Prison Farm. "The arrangements in every detail are efficient," said the report. "The new dining rooms and kitchens have just been closed in and their layout for the purposes of such an institution are

As in past years the grand jury found the Toronto Jail very unsanitary. At Minico Industrial School they found 50 boys locked in one dormitory, and in case of fire their lives would be in grave peril unless the guard, who sleeps in an adjoining room, happened to wake up. The jail farm on Yonge street evoked favorable comment. More Fire Escapes.

More fire escapes were recommended for the House of Providence, as the jury pointed out that the attic was being used for sleeping quarters. The patients at the Mimico Asylum seemed to be contented, altho a trifle overcrowded. The Queen street Asylum the Mercer Reformatory, the Central Prison and the Alexandra School were also inspected. The jury said that they found a number of inmates who were feeble-minded and suggested that other arrangements be made for them. They also recommended that a place

detention for vagrants be estab High Court Abused.
