"Edward G. Barrow, president of the International League, wired to headquarters here today from Buffalo denying that the major leagues had given \$50,000 or any other amount to the International League."

I suppose that it is the dearest wish of 99 out of 100 American boys to become real big league ball players. That is only natural. That was my earnest wish when I was a big, awkward youngster squeezed into a home-made uniform about we sizes too small for me.

Physical condition is the greatest asset of a professional baseball player. As a matter of fact, the same is true of any person, whether he be boy or man, no matter what vocation he may follow thru life.
