NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—All records for attendance and receipts for a world's championship series were broken. The National Commission to-night gave out the following figures: Attendance for six games, 179,821. Total receipts, \$242,204.20. Of this amount the players received \$127,910.61; each club received \$30,108.72, and the National Commission's share was \$34,284.87.

With the victory goes 60 per cent. of \$242,204.20, or \$145,322.52, of which each player will receive the remainder, \$1,164.24, or \$293.56 for each New York player.
