The Treaty of Paris were to be interpreted as privileges and not, in the sense that Catholics, as such, should be submitted to onerous penalties at the hands of their religious superiors.
The present Hebert case is an instance, said Mr. Wainwright, "of two Catholics who gave their mutual consent to a marriage. They secured a license from a duly qualified representative of public law—the lieutenant-governor. They went before one whom they had every reason to consider a duly qualified minister or officer empowered to celebrate marriages, and were married, lived together, and had a child. And now, simply because they are Catholics, enjoying free exercise of their religion, the church claims the right to step in and undo what they are not man and wife. I claim that such a state of affairs cannot be said to flow from the Treaty of Paris. The church has no right under such a treaty to make such a declaration."

Continuing, the speaker stated that he knew a farmer in Germany who farmed 23 acres who did all his plowing and farm work even to milking his cows, by electricity.

LONDON, Dec. 14.—The Daily Mail's Tangier correspondent says that the Princess Royal, the Duke of Fife and their two daughters and physician were landed by the French cruiser Du Chayla's boat, with enormous danger and difficulty, the sea was so completely over the craft. They landed below the signal station and had to walk drenched to the skin over the rocks to the light-house, where the Spanish guardians gave them some sort of dry garments.
Most of the other passengers were also landed. Some of them camped on the beach, while others rode or walked into town. The sudden rising of the sea swamped one of the Du Chayla's boats, drowning four of the sailors.
