In these two respects, the position of the mandatory would be the same as if he owned the territory; but in that case he would be able to recoup him-self by the advantages which would come to him then his administration of the territory. France, for instance, has always monopolized the trade of her colonial possessions; and while the United Kingdom and Germany leave the trade free, they reap advantages in various ways.
