CORNWALL CANAL BLOCKED. Ionia Strikes Gates and Tears Them From Their Fastenings.

CORNWALL, July 5 .- (Special.)-Navigation in the Cornwall Canal was blocked to-night by the wrecking of the two upper gates of lock 17 by the steam barge Ionia of Picton, owned by Capt. Ham of Ottawa and loaded to a depth of 10 feet with pulp wood, consigned from Three Rivers to Fort

The Ionia had entered lock 17 and as the lock was being filled she surged ahead and struck the south gate with great force, tearing it from its fastenings. The weight of water in the level a mile and a quarter long tore the other gate loose and threw the steamer stern first against the lower gates. Fortunately the fireman, hearing the shouts of the lockmen and steam ahead and thus relieved the pressure on the lower gates, which, altho damaged, did not give away. As soon as the matter was reported, Frank Lally, overseer of the Cornwall Canal, mustered a targe force of men, and after sending down Diver Walter Gallagher to clear away the wreckage and gravel in the botlifter to replace the gates. He hopes to have the canal fit for navigation

early in the morning, unless something unlooked for occurs.
