After an Interesting Speech by Sir

cretary of the Canadian High Commissioner in London-The League Advised to Keep the Zollverein in View and a Reduction in Duties on Certain Commodities From the Colonies is Sug-

London, June 15 .- A conference of the United Empire Trade League was held in this city to-day for the purpose of discussing the question of a commercial federation of the Empire. The Right Hop. James Lowther, M.P., formerly Under Secretary for the Colonies and Chief Secretary of Ireland, pre-

Sir Joseph G. Colmer, Secretary to the Canadian High Commissioner in London, made a speech, in which he lengthily referred to the motion made by Mr. E. B. Osler of Toronto, Ont. at the recent Congress of the Cham-bers of Commerce of the Empire, de-claring that the advantages arising claring that the advantages arising from a closer union of the Empire would justify an arrangement as nearly as possible in the nature of a zollverein, based upon principles of the freest exchange of commodities within the Empire consistent with the tariff requirements incident to the maintenance of the local government of each part of the Empire. Sir Joseph advised the League to keep the zoliverein in view, but declared it was not practical now owing to the fact that some of the colonies were unable to face the decrease in the revenue that would follow. He suggested that the duties on tea, coffee and cereals from the colonies be reduced to one-half the present amount. He moved that the Conference should urge upon the Government to abrogate as soon as possible the articles of the treaties with Belgium and Germany which prevented the colonies from giving preferential treatment to British goods. He also moved that an Imperial commercial conference be summoned. The motions were adopted.

The 60th anniversary of the Queen's accession to the throne, it is added, would be a suitable occasion for such a gathering. It is obvious that the request must originate from a colonial government.
