KERWIN STILL A MYSTERY

Quigley Clearly Outpointed in Bout That Went the 15 Rounds.

Big Crowd at Crescent Athletic Club's Boxing Show in Mutual-street. Ward Won From Chandler on the Decision—Barry and Godwin Go Five Fast and Clever Rounds for a Draw.

The most successful entertainment ever given by the Crescent Athletic Club was the show Saturday night in the Mutual-street rink.

George Kerwin, the famous Chicago mystery, was scheduled for the most important engagement in his ring career, and he went through it with flying colors, scoring a most decisive victory over one of the greatest boxers ever seen in this city.

The curtain-raiser, a five-round one, between Jimmy Barry and Charlie Godwin, at 100 pounds, showed the latter had proved himself since the meeting of the pair in the final for the championship of the C.A.A. last winter.

The winner had a big advantage in weight and reach, while Quigley apparently could not utilize the strength that he possessed in his muscular form.

The six contestants watched in at 3 o'clock, the first round being between Barry and Godwin seven rounds below, and Kerwin and Quigley at the top of the list.

The officials were: Referee, Walter C. Kelly; timekeepers, J. R. Bennett and John Tinning. Quigley a galaxy of stars were introduced, and the first bout was between the two lightweights, Jimmie Smith, New Orleans, 135 lbs.; Jack Randall, Canadian champion, accepted Randall's offer, and Jack Daly was also willing to meet the Hon. Homer Selby, manager and brother of Kid McCoy, was among those present.

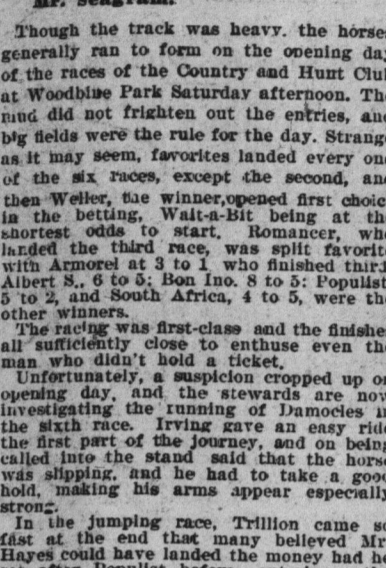
