The city gets iumber at \$2 per 1000 feet less than if would cost private purchasers, from the fact that it buys lumber by the million feet. It costs only two cents a nound for nails, where it costs ordinarily from 3½ to 4 cents. It is true that the employment of labor bureau men makes the cost about a cent a foot more, but this is more than counterbalanced by the saving in cost of material. Ald. Richardson owes it to the public to explain where he got and how he made his well-timed estimate.
