

RENTED A RICH MAN'S HOME

Clever Swindler Made a Flash in Buffalo and Took in Easy People.

HE WANTED PARTNERS WITH \$1000

And Opened Stores in Several Parts of the City—Fled With Some Money.

Buffalo, July 21.—Charles Elmdorf, a swindler, perhaps the cleverest Prince Albert coat-and-silk-hat confidence man that ever visited Buffalo, came here on May 1, spent 10 weeks and departed a few days ago with more than \$10,000.

United States government officials and secret service men are now scouring the country for him, but with little chance of success. So far they have succeeded in locating his servant girl, whom they traced from this city to Chicago, but they were unable to obtain anything from her that would assist them in locating the mysterious silk-hat man from the West.

Officers find five stores. The government officials have learned of five stores that he rented in this city, and in each he is supposed to have suited a partner. For each of these stores Brown is said to have obtained a partner with money. In the Elmwood-avenue store his partner gave him \$700 for an interest in the establishment.

From the great diversity of schemes in which Brown was interested, the officials believe that his operations have extended over the entire city and that he has cleaned up a remarkably large chunk of money. The fact that he opened up an establishment on almost every street. They believe that he may have shipped a large number of girls from this city under the guise of sending them to join a theatrical troupe in which he said he was supposed to be interested.

He claimed to represent a company that was to start out from Boston under the name of "The Lost Pearl."

Rented Home of Millionaire. Brown rented the furnished home of Millionaire Tyler in the heart of the fashionable district of Buffalo, at No. 127 Elmwood-avenue. He is a handsome man, a slight trace of grey in his hair, invariably wore a long Prince Albert coat, patent leather shoes, black tie and a silk hat. He bore every appearance of refinement, was well educated, an attractive conversationalist, and by reason of his extensive traveling and evident conduct with respectability, he was able to suit himself to any company into which he might have fallen.

There may be many diamond rings or brooches missing in society that can now be accounted for. The newcomer in the Elmwood-avenue district was not eager to pick up an acquaintance with those living nearby, and the forcing of acquaintance was done by the neighbors, not by Mr. Brown. It was noticed that a large number of young women called at the house, and some made repeated calls. Brown made frequent trips to the letter box each day, and on these trips invariably carried a handful of letters, as much of his confidence game is said to have been carried on in that way.

Wanted Partners With \$1000. As far as can be learned, Brown's principal work was to advertise for a partner to go into the dairy or butter and egg business. All his advertisements were very attractive and attractive, and he secured many young men with money who were willing to invest from \$500 to \$1000 in a business with so wealthy and influential a citizen as Mr. Brown appeared to be from his surroundings.

RELIEF FOR THE PLANTERS.

Half a Million Pounds for Sugar Industry of West Indies.

London, July 21.—A supplementary civil service estimate, issued to-day, aggregates upward of half a million pounds sterling, and provides £250,000 (\$1,250,000) for free grants in aid of the sugar industry of the West Indies. The government in the supplementary estimate asked for £250,000 in aid of the expenses of the coronation, caused by its postponement. This brings the total up to £1,250,000 (\$6,250,000).

DROPPED CASE OF DYNAMITE.

The Dallas, Ore., July 21.—A report has reached here that four men engaged in work on the Columbia River and Northern Railway, at Lytle, Ore., the Washington side of the Columbia, ten miles below here, while handling a case of dynamite, accidentally dropped it, the contents exploding, killing all of the four and seriously injuring a fifth man. LITIGATION OVER ELECTIONS

Application of Stormont Liberals to Have Conservative Petition Set Aside Dismissed With Costs.

HENDRIE FILES CROSS PETITION

There is a Possibility of Some Interesting Prosecutions in the North Ontario Case.

At Osgoode Hall yesterday, Judge Macdougall handed out judgment in the application of the Liberals of Stormont to have the Conservative petition set aside. He held that the petition was good, and said: "In the present case the petitioner's right to petition is the fact that he was a candidate at the election. The question is, does the petition contain a statement of fact? I think it does. I think that, reading the petition, the petitioner and the candidate upon a fair construction of it must be taken to be one and the same person. There might be a latent ambiguity, but none is shown, the other John McLaughlin in the constituency residing in a different township and being of a different occupation. The motion is dismissed without costs."

Major Hendrie's Deposit Paid.

On behalf of Mayor Hendrie, the Conservative member-elect for West Hamilton, Eric Armour yesterday paid into court the necessary \$1000 deposit in the cross petition against E. J. Shibley, Washington, the defeated Liberal candidate.

Conservative Cross Petition.

The Conservatives of Frontenac have entered a cross petition against the defeated Liberal candidate, W. J. Shibley.

Elber Has a Cross Petition.

Henry Elber, the successful Liberal candidate for South Huron, has filed a cross petition against his opponent, M. Y. McLean.

Some Will Be Prosecuted.

The friends of W. H. Hoyle, who carried North Ontario for the Conservatives, intend to stand by him. The protest against him will be fought to the end, and the deputy returning officers who neglected or exceeded their duties will be prosecuted, as well as several who took false oaths and voted.

MENACE TO BRITISH COMMERCE

Americans Making Effort to Grab South Africa Trade.

London, July 21.—The trade commission sent out to inquire into best methods for promoting British trade in South Africa seems much impressed with the great activity of the Americans. In its first report sent home, the commission says America will be the greatest menace to British trade, adding that the Americans are making a fine effort to get hold of the market, and are introducing their practice of specialization and concentration with the same result as so exemplified in other parts of the world.

BOERS VIEW NIAGARA FALLS.

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 21.—Four Boers, who had taken a prominent part in the South African war, in the persons of Peter Steyn, brother of ex-President Steyn, Col. J. P. Wellbach of Helibron, Capt. A. Hilary of Johannesburg, and Capt. J. F. Wellbach, Jr. of Helibron, were at the Falls taking in the sights yesterday on their way to South Africa via New York.

A WHALEBACK SCUTTLED.

Port Hope, Mich., July 21.—Fourteen of the crews of the whaleback steamer A. L. Thompson and barge Whitworth, stranded near Point Aux Barques, were taken off the wrecks by the life-saving crew to-day. The steamer has been scuttled to prevent her from pounding in to pieces during a gale. The Whitworth is almost hanging to the steamer by her tow line.

WAS HELD UP ON BROADWAY

Myron Franklin of Toronto Garrotted and Robbed of Watch and Other Valuables.

PURSUED THE THIEF INTO A HOTEL

Both Men Were Arrested for Possessing a Riot-Jewels Not Found.

New York, July 21.—Garrotted in the glare of the lights of Broadway, at the corner of Forty-first-street, at half past 11 o'clock last night, his gold watch and chain and pearl and diamond scarf-pin taken from him, Myron Franklin, 29 years old, of Toronto, Canada, precipitated a riot in that thoroughfare when he sought to recover his possessions.

Franklin, who is a salesman for a diamond firm and is stopping at the Hotel Vendome, chased Arthur Wade, who says he is an elevator operator, living at No. 711 East 144th-street, into the lobby of the Rosemont Hotel and a free fight ensued before any one knew what the row was about.

When the combatants reached the sidewalk Roundman Heitz and Policemen Hutchinson and Conlon of West Thirtieth-street station arrived and put both the struggling men under arrest. A big crowd had gathered and were watching the struggle.

Before Sergeant Dillon, at the station, Franklin told an almost incredible story of highway robbery. He said he was standing on the sidewalk in front of the Criterion Hotel when two men grabbed him and garrotted him, pushing him back against the side of a hansom cab.

While this was done another thief took the watch and chain and scarf-pin, and walking behind the cab ran to a passing Broadway car before Franklin could reach him.

Wade, who Franklin said was the second thief, went into the lobby of the Hotel Rosemont and he followed him, believing that he might have his property, and grappled with him. The friends of Franklin, who were with him all of the time, had the mistaken idea that Franklin's movements were the result of a friendly tussle and made no effort to help him.

Wade, who Franklin never saw Franklin until the latter came into the lobby of the Rosemont, was searching for the watch and chain and scarf-pin at the station, the stolen property was not found.

Franklin says that he was assaulted and relieved of a sum of money a few nights ago in Broadway, between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth-streets.

FEARED AN EXPLOSION.

Two Men Jumped into the River and Were Drowned.

Chicago, July 21.—By jumping into the Chicago river to escape an explosion, which they feared would follow the breaking of a gasoline tank on the launch, Charles Kubick and his brother, Duane, were drowned last night. Companions attempted to rescue the two men, but the current of the swollen stream baffled their efforts, and the bodies of the brothers were swiftly carried down the river and out of sight. The accident occurred at One Hundred and Forty-first-street, and was caused by a projecting edge of the gasoline tank coming in contact with an abutment of a bridge.

WIRELESS FOR ALASKA STEAMERS

American Engineer is Investigating Feasibility of Plan.

Seattle, Wash., July 21.—Richard Pfund, the engineer in charge of the expedition sent to Alaska by a wireless telegraph company, to establish a line for the government between Fort Gibson and Bates Rapids, is investigating the matter of a line between Cape Flattery and Skagway. A dispatching station on the line is established passenger steamers from California and the Orient sail twice a week, and the vessels to the stations on shore.

DEATH OF SAMUEL COOK.

Prominent Cattle Dealer in York County Dies of Heart Failure.

Samuel Cook, who resided on lot 6 in the rear of the 6th con. of Whit-church Township, near Lemonville, died suddenly of heart failure on Sunday afternoon. After complaining of not feeling well for the past two weeks Mr. Cook had been about as usual, and on Friday last was at a picnic at Jackson's Point.

On Sunday after dinner he took a stroll in the fields, returning to his house about 2 o'clock, when he laid down upon a sofa, complaining of a headache and a feeling of dizziness. He was found by his wife, who saw him, and when his daughter went to awaken her father she found him dead. Dr. Sangster of Stony Brook was summoned, but death had taken place at least an hour before.

Mr. Cook was 52 years of age, and was one of the best known cattle dealers in York County, as well as being a prominent florist on the Toronto Live Stock Market. Mr. Cook was highly respected by all who knew him, few having more friends, as was always of a pleasant disposition and ready to assist all who required help. He leaves a family of six children, being the issue of three marriages, the last wife having preceded him about one year. In religion he was a Methodist, and in politics a Conservative. The funeral will take place to-day at 2 o'clock to Lemonville Methodist Cemetery.
