Snow Storm on Lake St. Clair Makes Going Dangerous.

Tobemore, Nov. 17.—Yesterday during a heavy gale and snowstorm the steam barge Newaway of Port Huron, Mich., went ashore on Devil Island, five miles from here. Her consort, the Checotah of Port Huron, was towed here this morning by tug of the same name.

The Newaway is lying in shallow water in an exposed place. The crew of both boats are safe.

Inquiries for Graphite.

Mr. Watson states that Canadian graphite has been under a disadvantage in England owing to the belief that it is of an inferior quality to that produced in the United States.
