Probability of the Question Being Soon and Permanently

Canadian negotiations recently concluded here led to the signing of a protocol which formally agreed to the exact subjects to be submitted to an eneral understanding among officials that the Bering Sea question wil be adjusted and finally settled by the complete termination of pelagic scal-

This has been a source of controversy or many years, the United States eeking to put an end to pelagic sealing, and Canada, through the Imperial Government, contesting this termination of an industry very profitable to many citizens of the Canadian Pacific coast. During the recent negotiations, however, it developed that this industry was practically extinct, and was no longer profitable to any considerable number of Canadians. Heretofore the Canadian sealers have gone to the Bering Sea by the hundreds, and it was impossible for Canada to stop the industry without paying these sealers a very considerable sum, running into the millions, for the externation of their industry. Accurate figures are impossible to obtain, but it has been estimated that fully \$100,000,000 was spent in Europe last year by Americans, this sum in cluding the cost of travel across and persons went abroad. Now, assum that half of the persons who would otherwise have gone will stay home on account of the war. There is \$50,000, 000 kept in this country. But this is assumed that the 50 per cent of stay at-homes represent 50 per cent of the amount spent abroad. As a matter of fact, they represent far more than this, for the men restrained from going by the ticklish state of business in war times are the men of great interests who are able to and do spend large sums of money in making purchases in Europe. As for the economical tourists, those who save enough to go to Europe once in a lifetime, any slight inclination they might have toward staying at home this year is augmented by the fact that in 1900 comes the Paris Exposition, which will be worth waiting for. A well-known banker of this city estimates that from \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000 will be kept at home this year unless the war should end very

Europe will be fortunate if half that amount is spent this year, supposing, always, that the war lasts through the summer. It is well within the possibilities that a swift end should come to the war. In that case an unprecedented rush for transatlantic accommodations will reresult, and the lines will undoubtedly be swamped with business.
