Western Grain Standard Board and Others Ask for New Rules.

Advocates of Prohibition Divided as to the Best Course of Procedure-Trades and Labor Men Want a \$500 Poll Tax Placed on Chinese-Other Restrictive Measures.

[Special to The Advertiser per G.N.W.] Ottawa, April 18.-Representatives of the Western Grain Standard Board at Winnipeg and representatives from boards of trade from Montreal, Toronto and other leading cities in Ontario, waited on Sir Henry de Joli and Mr. Sifton today in regard to grain inspection. The western men favored adopting the grading of wheat under the word and meaning of the act so that the standard might be as closely made as possible and permanent. They also asked that all wheat be inspected at Winnipeg, and that no inspection should take place at Fort William or any other terminal elevator. The object is to place Manitoba wheat upon the European market in as pure state

as it left the farmers of the west. The resolution as to a permanent standard was adopted, the opposition of Ontario millers being principally as to the necessity of having something

such as a sample to buy from.

THE PROHIBITION QUESTION. A meeting of the committee of members of the House of Commons and Senate, selected by the legislative committee of the Dominion Alliance, and members of the House of Commons favorable to prohibition, was held this forenoon. The Berlin correspondent of the Assoclated Press hears on authority that the German consul at Apia, Samoa, Herr Rose, will receive instructions to join in a tripartite proclamation, calling upon all the inhabitants of Samoa to immediately desist from all hostilities and agitation, pending the arrival at Apia of the joint commission of the powers appointed to settle the affairs in dispute in the island.

NOTES. The Duke of Devonshire does not wish that his speech at Presteign on Saturday shall be taken as indicating his intention of retiring from politics.

A technical committee, appointed by the Austrian war office, has been making experiments with liquid air as an explosive. The effects were extraordinary.

Kansas City, April 18.-A cablegram received from Manila announces the death of Mrs. Buchanan, the young bride of Capt. Frederick E. Buchanan, Company B. Twentieth Kansas Regiment. She married Buchanan in San Francisco just before his regiment sailed for the Philippines, and sailed on a transport in disguise.

THE SAXTON MURDER TRIAL. Canton, O., April 18 .- In the trial of Mrs. Anna George for murdering Geo D. Saxton, the state has rested. The defense began today with a long list of witnesses.
