J. C. B.: Q.—I was born September 16, 1895. Would I be subject to the order-in-council, and if not would I have a chance to prove my claim, as I registered as 22 under the M. S. A.?

A.—As you had not attained the age of 23 years when you applied for exemption, you are included in the ages for which exemptions have been cancelled. If you are in Category A or have no category, you will be notified
