BUSINESS RELATIONS SET UP WITH DUMA

British and French Embassies "Sawing Wood"

LONDON, March 15.—A dispatch to Reuters Telegram Company, dated Wednesday night, says the British and French ambassadors established official business relations with the executive committee of the Duma.

The dispatch adds that the Grand Duke Cyril informed the Duma that he would place at its disposal the marines under his orders, and afterwards visited M. Rodzianko in the Duma and told him he was entirely at Rodzianko's orders. The correspondent says that the people of Moscow adhered to the revolutionary movement without bloodshed.

RUSSIAN EMPRESS, FORMER GERMAN PRINCESS, POPULACE SUSPECTED HER INFLUENCE

LONDON, March 15.—According to information received here the Russian people have been most distrustful during recent events of the personal influence of Empress Alexandra. She was supposed to exercise the greatest influence over Emperor Nicholas. It is stated that her whereabouts is not known, but it is believed she is in seclusion, fearing the populace.

The Empress Alexandra before the marriage to the emperor of Russia in 1894 was the German Princess Alix of Hesse-Darmstadt.

REJOICING AT MOSCOW; GARRISONS JOIN REVOLT FROM ALL BIG CENTRES

LONDON, March 15.—The popularity of the uprising in Russia against Germanism and official lethargy is indicated in the spontaneity with which the garrisons of provincial centres joined the movement. Such garrisons include Petrograd, Moscow, Kronstadt, Kharkov and Nizhni Novgorod.

Telegraphing from Petrograd Wednesday, Reuters correspondent says Kronstadt, the fortress and the seaport at the head of the Gulf of Finland, 20 miles west of Petrograd, has joined the revolutionary movement. Two deputies, Popelau and Taskine, on instructions from the Duma committee, proceeded to Kronstadt, where the troops placed themselves at the disposal of the Duma.

M. Popelau was appointed commandant of Kronstadt, which is Russia's great naval station.

Ancient Capital Joyous. "Moscow, the ancient capital of Russia, rejoices with popular rejoicing over the overthrow of the Government," says Reuters Moscow correspondent. "The officers have rallied to the new national government, and a

military committee has been formed to preserve order and regulate food supplies. The committee is backed by a brigade of artillery, five regiments of infantry and the armed militia.

"Gen. Drososky, commander of the troops in the Moscow district, has been arrested. More than a thousand police and gendarmes also have been arrested and brought to the town hall. All the political prisoners in the great Butyrky prison have been released. "The cities of Kharkov and Nizhni Novgorod, the latter the capital of the province of that same name, have declared for the new government."

KHARKOV GARRISON, TOO. PETROGRAD, March 15.—The garrison at Kharkov has formally joined the revolution, and is supporting the provisional government. Strikes in sympathy with the movement have been called in factories and on the street car lines.

Kharkov is the capital of the province of the same name. It is 430 miles south of Moscow, and has a population of about two hundred thousand.

ANOTHER ADVANCE MADE BY BRITISH ON EXTENDED LINE

Germans Retire Between Peronne and Bapaume.

LONDON, March 15.—Another important gain has been made by the British troops between Peronne and Bapaume, according to the official statement issued tonight.

Trenches on a front of two and a half miles, running from the south of the St. Pierre-Vaast wood to the north of the village of Sailles, have been occupied.

Southwest of Arras the Germans entered British trenches.

The communication says: "The area of the enemy's withdrawal has extended toward the south. We have occupied his trenches on a front of two and one-half miles from south of the St. Pierre-Vaast wood to the north of the village of Sailles."

"Early this morning a strong enemy counter-attack east of Achiet-le-Petit was successfully beaten off by our troops. We have improved our position in this neighborhood."

"This morning, after a heavy bombardment, the enemy succeeded in entering our trenches southeast of Arras. A few of our men are missing. Another enemy raiding party was repulsed during the night northeast of Neuville-St. Vaast."

LEGISLATURE NOISY WHEN GRAFT CHARGE IS AGAIN BREEZED

Member for Sturgeon Falls Sticks to Statements.

SEES FRIGHTFUL WASTE

Declares Contradiction by Conservative Candidate Is Untrue.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, March 15.—Alleged misuse and deplorable waste of public funds in connection with the construction of colonization roads in New Ontario was warmly condemned in the Legislature tonight by Zolique Mageau (Sturgeon Falls), who spoke on an amendment to a motion that the House go into committee of supply. Mr. Mageau gave figures from the public accounts, showing that hundreds of dollars had been spent on tools, and commenting on these expenditures he declared "90 per cent of those tools could not be found today if five hundred detectives were engaged to look for them."

He charged that a large amount had been paid for "rent of tools" to a man who does not own a horse, a cow, a scraper or a plow, or a tool of any description. "Graft and Dishonesty. The Government's system of building colonization roads resulted in frightful waste of money, graft and dishonesty," he said. "In the township of Glasholm the Government had paid \$131 to a man for five and a half days' work, and the inspectors sent to see that the work had been done properly found in another case were not qualified. One was a watchmaker (laughter), the second was a carpenter, and the third was a butcher (laughter). He declared thousands of dollars had been squandered."

There was a stormy scene when the minister of Colonization, Hon. Mr. Macdormid, referred to charges made recently by Mr. Mageau that \$1,200 was spent on the construction of a road which benefited no one but the Conservative candidate at the last election, who has a ranch in the district. Repeats Charge. Mr. Macdormid asked Mr. Mageau if he persisted in making that charge. Mr. Mageau—I do. Mr. Macdormid—I have a letter here from Mr. Martin, the Conservative candidate at the last election, and he says not a dollar was spent on the road on this side of his home. The money was spent entirely north or beyond his home, in the township of Field. (Conservative applause.) The statement of Mr. Martin was verified today by Senator Gordon. (Renewed Government applause.) Mr. Mageau—The statement is untrue. I do not say the hon. minister is not telling the truth, but the statement made to him by Mr. Martin is untrue. Colonel Cameron (North Grey)—Who are we to believe—those two gentlemen or you? Mr. Macdormid—Mr. Martin, in his letter, says the road is three miles beyond his place and the letter will be available for your inspection before the public accounts committee. Mr. Cameron—Now you will have the privilege of swearing to it. Mr. Macdormid—This is a mail route.

Serves Only One.

Mr. Mageau—That is again wrong. It is not a mail route. The mail goes by the C. N. R. The road serves only at the last election and does not benefit the other settlers. Mr. Macdormid, in conclusion, read a letter from D. McBeth, reeve of Widdfield (East Nipissing), to the effect that he had recommended overseers for the road, and they did their work well. Mr. Macdormid declared he was a Liberal, but felt he should make the statement in justice to Henri Morel, M.P.P., for East Nipissing. "No instructions have been given to favor one political party or another," said Mr. Macdormid. "The only instructions given are to get the best results for the money expended." (Conservative applause.) On division Mr. Mageau's amendment was defeated by 45 to 17.

KEEP POLITICS OUT OF WAR APPROPRIATIONS

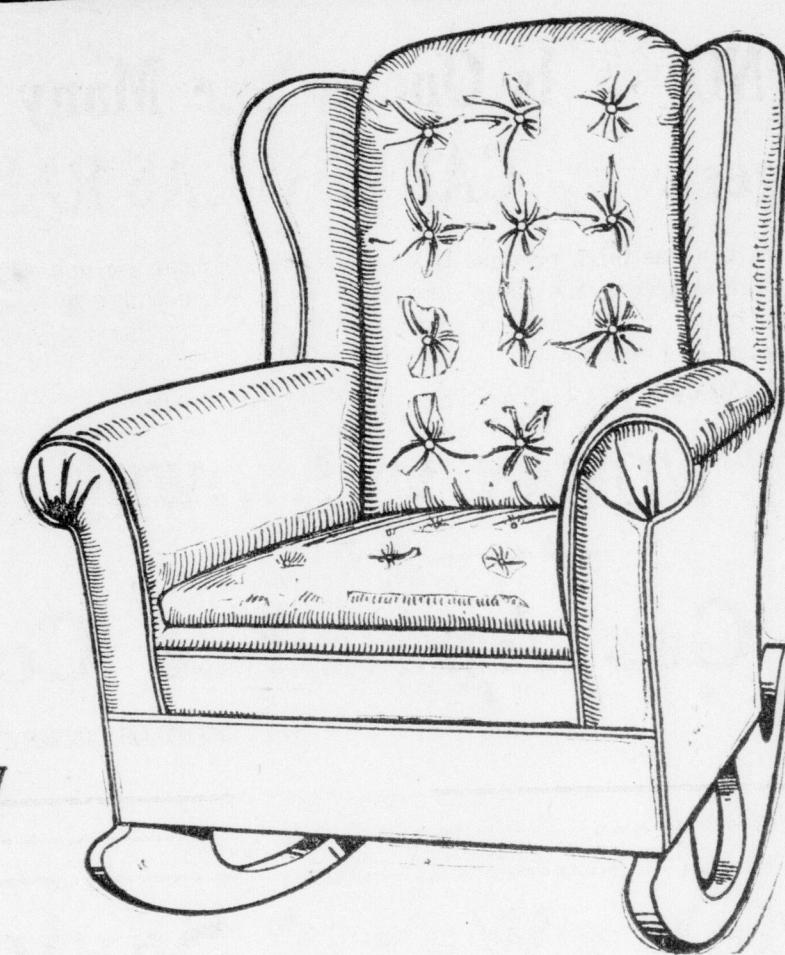
