Healthful Recreation Required for Girls Who Are Work- ing All Day.

Addressing the Union Mothers' Club at the quarterly meeting last evening held in the Lord Roberts' School, Miss Lukes, general secretary of the Y. W. C. A., emphasized the crying need for extension of work on behalf of girls and women to the young women of the Christian Association for the Young Women's Society. "The Y. W. C. A.," she said, "is doing a lot of work with Red Cross and patriotic work." Do those women ever stop to realize if young men have no ideals before them, all that our men are fighting for will be useless? "The men are fighting for the women, and it is right that it should be. But the men who are fighting, thinking of their country, are fighting for the women of their country. Their country will not be won fighting for their sisters and

Places for Girls. "Places have been provided in which the men can find recreation. The girl who works all day is restless, dull and dispirited, needs healthful recreation to ward off nervous life. What has been done to provide this for her in this city? And yet this is the city where the girls seeking diversion in dance halls and at the moving pictures.

"I have strolled down a street of London in the evening. I have seen girls of all ages, and is years going to the ball, and the girls in the motor cars. The men who owned the cars and went in to dance were not good enough to be associated with the girls in such associations and in the girls going away in the cars. And yet what is being done for the girls?"


